"Under Two Flags" is one of the few really great stories. A love epic immortal, a tragedy sublime, "Under Two Flags" captures the heart of the world when it came as a novel from the pen of Gide (Louis de La Ramée), and its growth in popularity was heightened by its presentation on the stage by many renowned artists, including Blanche Bates. Priscilla Dean, then whom there is no more magnetic figure on the screen, breathes the fire of her dramatic personality into the role of Clarette, idol of a French regiment at Algiers.

There are street scenes in "Under Two Flags," that give a true insight of the life of the masses in this French province of Northern Africa. The military pomp of an army post is accurately presented. And the oppressive luxury surrounding the pampered beauties of a shell's harem add picturesque color to this dramatic film.

Every interior setting, every street scene was constructed with faithful accuracy. Hundreds of photographs of different parts of Algiers were obtained to guide them in their work. Not an inharmonious note was allowed to creep in.

The result is that those seeing "Under Two Flags" might well imagine they are spending an evening in the African desert. While the picture is superb as a spectacle, it is also the work of great historic value. Tod Browning, the director, has developed the romance of the tale in masterly fashion.

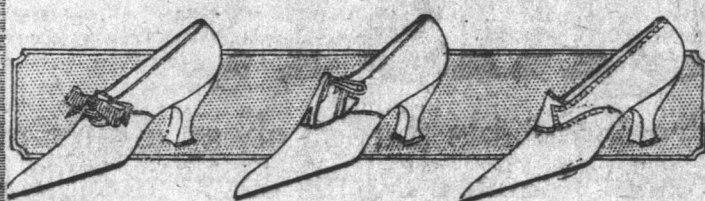

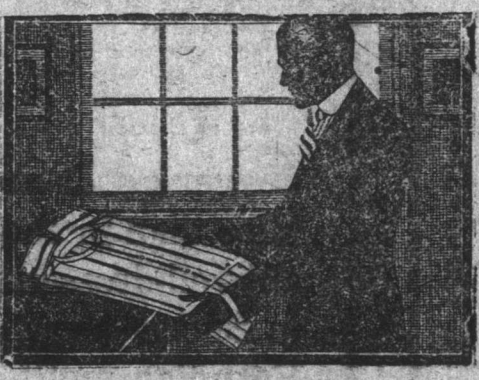

Montrealers Out for
Labrador Gold.

Sydney, N.S., June 20.—(Canadian Press).—Filled to the hatches with gasoline and other supplies, a nameless fifty-foot motor launch lies here all ready for a dash to Labrador and the hoped-for gold fields.

Captain David Abbott, in command, is waiting for two mining engineers from Montreal, Williams and Crosby, and the moment they arrive his little craft will head for the Straits of Bell's Isle. His brother, Ira Abbott, and William Goreham, of Woods Harbor, Shelburne Co., are the crew.

Captain David is making a strictly business voyage with passengers and supplies. He is not a gold digger.

"There may be gold there," he said, "but all I can say is that if one gets a barrel of gold there, he will earn it. The black flies and mosquitoes in that country are something terrible. There is perfect co-operation between them. At sunrise these insignificant-looking little black flies show up and work all day without murmur or complaint. When the brief Arctic summer night comes, the mosquito relieves them, wing for wing and carry on."
