

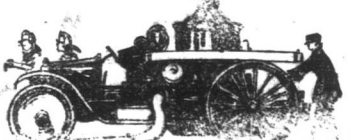

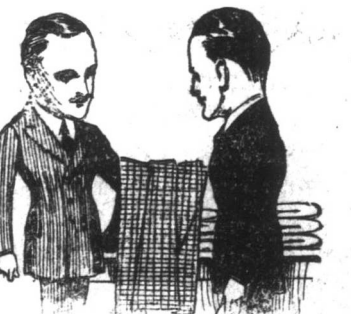

## Bay Bulls Notes

### A NOVEL EXPERIMENT.

The nearby settlement of Bay Bulls is rapidly growing to be a favorite resort for holiday seekers, after open waters and beautiful scenery. Parties come by motor bus and train to the excellent fishing ponds in the vicinity, and many of them stray down to enjoy its cool grass-bordered lanes and the whole-hearted hospitality of its people. One regrettable thing, the first to strike the visitor, is the fine unoccupied premises known as "The Plant." This, a few years ago, was a hive of industry under the energetic management of Mr. John Clouston of St. John's. Shredded fish and fish meal in many attractive forms were put up, fish fertilizer and other by-products were handled with skill and gave employment to many men and girls of this harbor. What's the matter? It's a long time now since we heard that war-time shibboleth "Business as usual."

The precariousness of the fisherman's toil, its uncertainty, its risks, its dishonorings and then its sudden turn towards bright and hope inspiring prospects, can be noted in the happenings of 48 hours. During the high winds and strong tides of last week several traps came in for hard usage, one was dragged and sank to the bottom, buoys broken, and the tangle that drift-twined and a racing tide produce met the owners, Messrs. Rupert and Joseph Williams when they went to overhaul. It is in such stress as this that the brotherhood of the sea manifest itself, the Packs, the Gatherals, Richard Williams and others were on the spot to render hearty assistance to their friends in need. Neighbourly acts like this amount to heroic charity, for those men had traps and trawls of their own to see to yet stood by with help that heartened. One of Mr. Gerald Williams' traps had a slight mishap that was fixed up in an evening, and the next morning rewarded its owner with 40 quays prime fish. There is a good sign all round and we hope before many days all shall be deep in the gurry of well filled trap skiffs.

The three masted schooner Freedom, Cape W. Noseworthy, salt laden from Turks Island to Mr. Ambrose Hearn, is discharging at that merchant's wharf, and is surrounded by many small boats and craft that are taking supplies to all parts of the Southern Shore. On this premises a most interesting experiment is going on. Two tanks, each with a capacity of 12 hundred gallons, which sea water is kept in continuous circulation are stocked with live cod fish; one tank is completely covered in the other open. Mr. Hearn is conducting this experiment under the direction of an American Piscatorial College and is endeavoring to ascertain the effect of environment and of certain foods on the vitamine producing qualities of our codfish. A professor is to arrive here in July to test the results obtained. All this shows what concentrated interest medical science is taking in Newfoundland cod liver oil and should be an incentive to those in the business to produce the best. We are glad to be able to state here that Bay Bulls carried off the trophy for this world famed article of our commerce last year, Mr. Gerard Williams being awarded the coveted prize medal.

The Rev. P. O'Brien, our progressive parish priest and veteran boat builder, is still "on the job," he is now constructing a 36 foot yacht which he hopes will eclipse all his former triumphs. She is built on lines of his own invention, lines that have revolutionized ship building since their introduction to naval architecture some of the largest ships afloat being built from this design. And now note this, ye who have been approached so many times about it, a much needed public utility now in demand is a wharf on the north side of this harbor. The old public wharf is gone by the board, if it were not for the courtesy of those in charge of "The Plant" the men of this place would be sadly handicapped, having nowhere to land their nets when accidents like those mentioned above (and they are always liable to happen). Let the next thing undertaken be a new wharf on the site of the old one.

## Lifetimes at Law

### ROMANTIC CLAIMS TO VAST ESTATES.

An eighty-two-year-old lawsuit has just been settled in Italy. It was started in 1841 by a man who claimed about \$4,000,000 from the State on account of land which he alleged really belonged to one of his ancestors. Judgment has now been given against the claim, but the original claimant died long ago.

A Gretia Green marriage in 1840 resulted in a lawsuit which extended over thirty-five years. The husband, later on, repudiated his wife and child, and married again. At his death the son by the second marriage took possession of his father's estate. He alleged that his half-sister was illegitimate.

She then instituted the lawsuit which was finally decided only a short time ago. The court held that the father's first marriage was legal, and that the daughter is entitled to the estate of \$30,000. The latter is now eighty years of age.

### Age-Long Legal Battles.

In another case, lasting over half a century, both the principals and all the witnesses died before the settlement. The proceedings involved a claim to the land on which stands a four-story American town. After fifty years of litigation a verdict was given in favour of the sixty-year-old daughter of the original claimant. She thus became worth \$120,000. All these cases are infants compared with a lawsuit which extended over five centuries. It was a claim for the stupendous sum of \$207,000,000, and was made by the heirs of an Italian aristocrat whose possessions had been confiscated by the State in the sixteenth century. The claimants argued that the confiscation was illegal, but eventually the Naples Appeal Court decided against them.

## Opening a Way to Development

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir—The people of St. George's District have at last awakened to the fact that public utilities are not meant for the few but should be used for the public in general. The fault perhaps lies more with the powers that have been than with the people themselves. St. George's District is perhaps to-day more in the public eye than any other district in the country because of the vast possibilities of the Harbour project.

We have here the making of a great shipping port, sheltered from all winds and capable of admitting the largest ships—a sum of fifty thousand dollars were spent on dredging the lower channel from the leading lights out. Inside the channel we have from sixteen to twenty-five feet of water. In the channel itself the depth is from fourteen to twenty-four feet.

All the valuable minerals of this section of the country—coal, iron and gypsum also the timber resources of this District suffer for want of a harbor. It is well known to many active mining men and to parties interested in the timber resources of this District that these industries cannot thrive without a proper shipping port and all business deals in connection with same have been turned down on that account. Only recently a proper survey of the channel and harbor was made, thanks to the enterprise of the principal owner of the iron and gypsum properties in this section of the country. The parties interested have spent many thousands of dollars on these properties and we understand developments on a large scale are about to be undertaken.

Quite a few copies of the survey of the harbor have been distributed amongst our leading men, and public interest has at last been awakened to the future possibilities of St. George's. It is now up to our people to see that there will be a suitable shipping port between Port aux Basques and Bay of Islands so that the vast resources of this section of the country will not be retarded any longer. We have every faith in our new Prime Minister, Hon. W. S. Monroe, and to his able representative, Mr. Power to see that Capt. W. Winsor, our able Minister of Marine and Fisheries who knows the need of good harbors to the fishermen, and who will see that St. George's will get a square deal.

The writer will in a later issue go more particularly into the immense possibilities of St. George's with regard to its mining and timber resources. Thanking you for space.

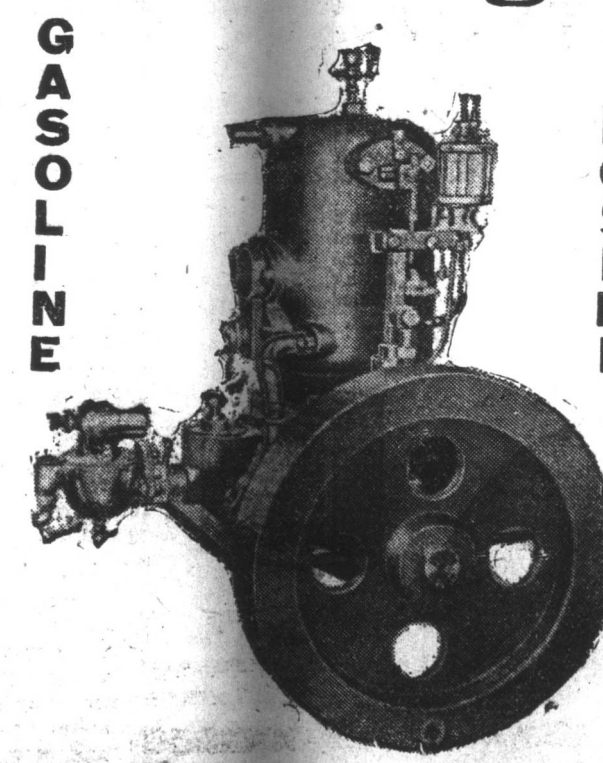
