Notes of a Trip to Muskoka.

(Concluded.)

The farmers who have made clearances of any size are doing remarkably well, and not a few are making money. An immense lumbering business is carried on in this region, and produce of all kinds finds a ready sale at high prices. Last spring hay was \$40 a ton, and oats 80 cents a bushel, and farmers could get these prices at their own doors in hard cash. There is no doubt that good prices will be paid for all kinds of farm products as long as the lumber trade continues, which will be for some years to come, as there are immense tracts of good pine timber yet untouched. On the rocky ridges the pine is poor and scrubby, but in the more fertile sections the trees grow to a good size, and the timber is of excellent quality. From all the reports we could gather we are inclined to think that Muskoka is better adapted for grazing purposes than for farming, and it may be in after years that it will become one of the most valuable portions of Ontario, where immense herds of cattle and flocks of sheep will be raised and fed for consumption in the large commercial centres of the Dominion.
