GREAT MASTERPIECES IN SOME LITTLE-KNOWN MUSEUMS OF FRANCE

Paris, May 15—In art, as in other matters, people are apt to follow the beaten paths too closely. Travel hav-ing at all times been considered as, ing at all times been considered as, perhaps, the greatest educational factor, they go abroad with a desire to complete their education and, very likely, make their first stop at Paris, "La Ville Lumiere," where every street and avenue is cluttered with objects of wonder and every stone seems to have been stamped with the magic word "art"

If they are artistically inclined, they follow the suggestion of the tourist's inseparable Baedeker, which is to pay a visit to the Louvre, the greatest art museum in the world, which holds more treasures than any three of four more treasures than any three of four other museums combined. There they know how to spend the few hours, or the few minutes, that they can spare, for the guidebook makes it plain that they should not miss Greuze's "Broken Pitcher," Vigee Le Brun's "Portrait of Herself and Daughter," Corot's "Dance of the Nymphs," a few other renowned masterpleces, and ..* * the spot now deserted from which the "Mona Lisa" bestowed her mysterious smile upon generations of more fortunate visitors.

For the Louvre and Versailles, large as they are, do not by any means contain all of France's artistic riches. They are still many great museums scatteerd through the land, smaller than the Louvre to be sure, but second to none of our great American museums, if quality be taken as chief consideration.


