PHILADELPHIA, June 30.—At a meeting

Philadelphia, June 30.—At a meeting of a number of prominent lightmen yesterday in St. Michael's Haffa resolution was unanimously adopted to affiliate with the Irish Federation of America, which was organized in New York a few weeks ago, and cut off connection with the Irish National League. After the meeting had been called to order Hugh Mccaffrey, vice-president offthe Irish National League of America, reported the doings of the municipal council and the bitter fight between the Farnellites and the McCarthyites and the personal and unbecoming remarks that were made at the last meeting. He then read a communication from Dr. Addis Emmett, of New York, requesting that the branch affiliate with the Irish Federation. It repudiated Parnell and declared that he never again would be the leader of the Irish Parliamentery party, and that he had fallen by his own hand. He also referred to the \$200,000 which is locked up in a Paris bank through Mr. Parnell's stubborn refusal to release it. After several others had spoken on the subject a resolution was offered to affiliate with the Irish federation, which was unanimously carried. 
