IN AWFUL AGONY.

Heartrending Scenes at an Explosion of Chemical Works.
LONDON, July 28.—Heartrending scenes have been witnessed at Gateshead, where the condensers of the chemical works collapsed, causing the death of six workmen and the injury of several others. The bursting of the condensers shattered the building and caused the huge chimneys to topple over. It was the falling of these masses of brick and stone that crushed the victims. One of the injured men is still pinned down by the debris, having suffered agony for ten hours, during which time hundreds of rescuers have been trying in vain to release him. The unfortunate man is so held down that every effort to extricate him adds to his sufferings, and he prays to be let alone to die in peace. All that can be done is to give him tea and brandy, without which stimulant he would have succumbed ere this. The wrecked building is surrounded by an excited and lamenting throng.

TREACHEROUS WATERS.

Two Drowning Accidents in the North-west—Five Hamilton Boys Have a Narrow Escape.

WINDSOR, July 28.—News comes from Fort Francis of the drowning of Robert Wilson at Manitow Rapids on Friday. The steamer Shamrock was on her trip up and Capt. Lewis and Wilson were in the attempt of getting out a line to hold on to the steamer over the rapids when the yawl got upset and Wilson was drowned. He formerly came from Annapolis.
The little daughter, 2 1/2 of Lieut. Col. Boswell, of the Nineteenth Rifles, this city, was drowned at Rat Portage Monday while bathing in the Lake of the Woods.
HAMILTON, July 28.—There was almost another drowning accident here on Saturday. Five boys—John Robb, E. O'Grady, Fred Diamond, Wm. O'Grady and J. Forbes—went out in a small yacht. They succeeded in reaching the beach, but the boat being the yacht went over and the lads were thrown into the water. They clung to the boat for an hour before being rescued by the crew of the Pacific, much exhausted.
