

DON, July 28.—Heartrending se ave been witnessed at Gatoshead, where he condensers of the chemical works col have over witnessed at Gatosnead, where the condensers of the chemical works collapsed, causing the death of six workmen and the injury of several others. The bursting of the condensers shattered the building and caused the huge chimneys to topple over. It was the falling of these masses of brick and stone that crushed the victims. One of the injured men is still pinned down by the debris, having suffered agony for ten hours, during which time hundreds of rescuers have been trying in vain to release him. The unfortunate man is so held down that every effort to extricate him adds to his sufferings, and he prays to be let alone to die in peace. All that can be done is to give him tea and brandy, without which stimulant he would have succumbed ere this. The wrecked building is surrounded by an excited and lamenting throng.
