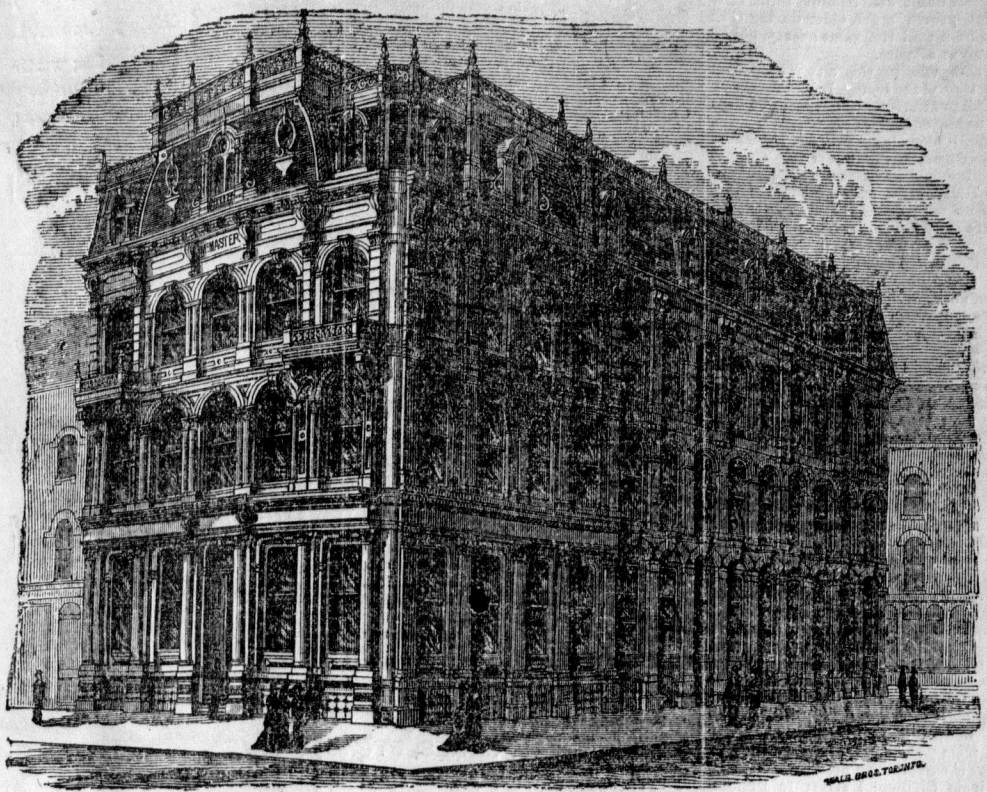

THE BIG BORE.

Everything Ready for the St. Clair Tunnel Opening.

SARITA, Sept. 19.—All the arrangements for the opening of the St. Clair tunnel to-day are completed, and the work and approaches are in good shape. At 11:45 a.m. the inaugural train, with Sir Henry Tyler, L. J. Seagrave, Joseph Hobson, J. L. Leach, and other officials of the Grand Trunk, will proceed to the approach on the Canadian side. There Sir Henry will be presented with an address from the Senate and the House of Commons. The train will go through the tunnel. On the United States side an address from the Port Huron Council will be presented. At 2 o'clock the inaugural train will commence, and many prominent men from both countries will be present, including Erastus Wiman, Sir John Ross, Sir Casimir Gzowski, Senator Frank Smith, Messrs. Ross, Gibson and Harcourt, of the Ontario Cabinet; Gov. Winans, Lieut.-Gov. Strong, Senator Vidal, J. F. Lister, M.P., John C. Donnelly, John Dell, Congressman Whiting, Youmans, Clipman, Gorman, Tarney and others. This evening Sir Henry Tyler and party are being banquetted by the citizens of Port Huron.

WATCHMAKERS AT WAR.

Waltham and Elgin Companies Combine to Knock Out Duobler.

CHICAGO, Sept. 18.—A morning paper says: War has again broken out among the big watchmakers of America. This time the Waltham and Elgin companies have pooled their resources and by one blow seek to wipe out of existence their foe, John C. Duobler, who has been fighting the trust for several years. Some months ago Duobler put a watch movement on the market at \$9.50 which had formerly been sold at \$15. Now a circular has been placed in the hands of every jobber in the world who handles the Elgin and Waltham movements. It carried with it a notice that hereafter all movements of this class would be sold at a reduction of 30 per cent. In rebates on goods already in jobbers' hands and on goods in stock this reduction is said to amount to \$400,000 for the Elgin company and \$1,000,000 for the Waltham.

ESSEX.

DUFFERIN.

John Piggott, foreman of the bush gang engaged in clearing the railway grounds of bushes, found a small iron box in the ditch near the tank, about three miles from Shelburne.

Mr. Piggott informed Dan Telford, section foreman. Telford had heard about the Smith murder case in Amaranth in 1882, and he at once thought it was the missing box. The box was filled with papers. Detective Webb, of the Ontario Medical Association, has had "Dr." Bentley, of Oil Springs, placed under arrest and fined \$50 and costs for practicing medicine without a license.

Alvin McLaren, an employee of the Sarina gas works, was overcome by gas Thursday while changing a purifier, and was prostrated. He was found in an insensible condition and medical aid summoned. He will recover.

Conductors Woods and Fitzgerald, of Toronto, have been ordered to Sarina in anticipation of the changes in the running arrangements of the Grand Trunk Railway to follow the opening of the tunnel.

Messrs. Robertson and Van Liew, vessel inspectors of Port Huron district, last week issued a license to Mrs. Celia Parsons to command a passenger boat. She will sail

the Florence P. between Thunder Bay Island and lake ports. This is the first woman in the district of Huron who has ever passed the required examination to become a captain.

MIDDLESEX.

W. H. Ellison, of Moss, lost a package containing \$350 from his coat pocket while in Gloucester one day last week.

Atkinson, contractor, Portage, Man.; Arthur Atkinson, grain merchant, Winnipeg; John Atkinson, who works the old homestead in Biddulph.

The annual harvest home services in connection with the Boston Methodist Church, McGillivray, were held on Sept. 13. Large congregations assembled and the pastor, Rev. J. E. Holmes, preached. The church was tastefully decorated. On Sept. 16 the harvest home festival was held. THE FALL ASSIZES.

KENT.

CHATHAM, Sept. 18.—William Paulucci, convicted on several charges of forgery, has been sentenced to five years in the penitentiary. He belonged to a respectable family.

William Plummer, who pleaded guilty to being an accomplice with Paulucci in the forgery and altering, has been sentenced to three years in the penitentiary. Mr. Justice MacMahon remarked that he considered Plummer had been led into the crime by Paulucci.

Nicholas Ballard, charged with obtaining money from Dover township by false pretences, was discharged, his lordship not allowing the case to go to the jury. He thought the charge could not be made out owing to the financial dealings between Ballard and the township.

OXFORD.

WOODSTOCK, Sept. 18.—McDonald vs. Parry was an action to set aside one in favor of the issue of a second marriage of the testator, in order that one previously made in favor of the first marriage might be established as the true will. The ground on which the second will was attacked was that when the testator made the second will he was not of sound mind. Before all the evidence was put in the counsel engaged in the case, acting on a suggestion from Mr. Justice Falconbridge, arranged a settlement involving the admission of the second will to probate.

Hugh Day, of East Nisour, was the defendant in a suit for the seduction of the daughter of Mrs. Camilla McCracken. Verdict for the plaintiff and damages of \$700.

WENTWORTH.

HAMILTON, Sept. 18.—John Hyde, James Henry and Alfred Hobbs were all found guilty of larceny, and were sentenced to three and five years each respectively in Kingston penitentiary.

The charges of assault and attempted rape preferred against Ezekiel Morton by Patricia Walala were taken up. Mrs. Walsh swore that a man entered her house while she was asleep and attempted an indecent assault. She recognized the man's voice as that of Morton. The jury did not consider this sufficient evidence and discharged the prisoner.

During the past year, twelve former students and graduates of the Canada Business College of Chatham have secured positions in other business colleges and schools with commercial departments, the majority of them either as principals or principal assistants; five have secured salaries ranging from \$1,000 to \$1,200 per annum, two of them to receive \$1,500, leaving with the second year's service. Within the past two months five former students and graduates have found places whose combined salaries are \$7,720, or an average of \$1,544 each; one of them on a three years' engagement, on which he is to receive \$1,500 for the first year, \$1,800 for the second and \$2,000 for the third. The latter referred to was a farmer's son with no knowledge of business matters, and who, up to the time he commenced his course at the college, had lived at home on the farm, in the county of Middlesex; his early education being acquired in the public school in the section in which he lived. By the above it will be seen that it pays to attend a good school. These salaries are, of course, very much higher than is ordinarily received by our students when they first start out, but it shows that our work is such as will fit the person with the natural ability to fill such places.
