DRANK CHLOROFORM.

Arthur Waterman's Deliberate Attempt at Suicide,

-He Had Been Drinking.

Emptied a Half-Onnce Bottle of the Drug

One of the most deliberate and sensational attempts at suicide recorded in the city occurred at the corner of York and Ridout streets about 10:30 last night, when Arthur Waterman, a young man 25 years of age and unmarried, drank an ounce of chloroform, while in a frenzy caused by drink.

Waterman is the junior partner in the firm of Simons & Waterman, second-hand furniture dealers. King street, and is an industrious and hard-working fellow. Drink, however, has been a curse to him, and while under its influence he is almost uncontrollable.

Yesterday he was was engaged at the residence of Mr. B. C. McCann, South London, putting up stove pipes. He quit work at 6 o'clock, and Mr. Simons, who lives at the corner of Simcoe and Henry streets, with whom Waterman boarded, watched for his return at the usual hour. But Waterman, instead of going home to tea, went on a spree. He failed to return by 9 o'clock, and Simons, feeling uneasy at his partner's absence, started up town in

search of him Waterman was found half an hour later at the corner of Talbot and King streets engaged in a war of words with a stranger who, too, had been drinking. Simons and a friend named Frank Mann had to use a great deal of persuasion to get Waterman's consent to withdraw. He was in a rage and wanted to fight-nothing else would satisfy him. Finally he agreed to go, and down King street to Ridout he went, Simons and Mann holding either arm. At the corner of Ridout and York finally succeeded, and as he freed his right arm from the hold of Mr. Simons he dipped bottle, drank the contents, uttered the

vial to one side. Waterman was unconscious in a very short time, and was removed to Dr. Logie's office, near by. The doctor was not at home, and Drs. Fraser and Teasdale were summoned. They administered an emetic, but as the poison had been absorbed it was powerless. A galvanic battery was then applied, and it soon resulted in the respir-

ation being restored. Waterman was afterwards removed to the hospital, where his recovery will probably be a matter of a few days.

The Nettie mentioned above is a daughter of Mr. Simons, and was on the scene shortly after the suicidal attempt was made. The bottle was recovered and handed to the police. The drug had been

Wodnesday Afternoon. The jury in the Bowers manslaughter Robertson took his seat at 2:30 this afternoon. Bowers, in the dock, wore the same haggard look that has characterized his eatures since his incarceration on June 24. The spectators filled the seats and chairs around the table, and included Father Connolly, the prisoner's spiritual adviser for

eight years past, and Father Tiernan, of this city. The clerk of the court inquired in the usual way whether or not a verdict had been reached; if so, what? "Guilty, with a recommendation to the greatest degree of mercy," responded the foreman, and the silence pervading the room was deathlike. Judge Robertson discharged the jury, thanking them and all the petit jurors for

their attendance. Sentence of the court upon the prisoner was then moved by Mr. McDougall. "Well, I will ask the prisoner what he

has to say," said Judge Robertson. Bowers stood up, and in a broken voice

NATURE'S TREASURES.

This Summer's Finds by Botanists

of London.

An Insectiverous Plant - A' New Geranium-Alfa-Alfa Appears-The Chicory Pest-A New Clover-A Birr That Pains.

The botanical section of the Entemological Society has just completed another summer's research among the woods and dales and mossy dells of London and vicinity, and as a result many specimens have been obtained that are foreign to and in cases entirely unknown in the flora of the case were in their places when Judge London district. With the cold weather this section of the society, like many of the plants which its members study, changes somewhat in the winter time, and is known as the microscopical section, When the flowers bloom again and the leaves begin to sprout they will once more be the botanical section. Mr. John A. Balkwell, South London, the treasurer of the society, is chairman of this section and an indefatigable searcher after botanical knowledge. Mr. Wm. T. Clement, B.A., teacher of botany at the Collegiate Institute, and secretary of the section, is also a lover of this branch of study, and accompanies many of his pupils in their rambles through wood and fen, amid nature in all her leveliness. Dr. Hodson, another member of the Collegiate Institute staff, is deeply interested in the study, but has an especial fondness for microscopical research. Prof. J. H. Bowman not only is well posted in all matters botanical but can talk about the finds of the section in an interesting manner. Mr. Wm. E. Saunders, whose father compiled the first flora of this district, while an earnest student of all pature, is much interested in this branch of the study. Inspector Dearness is one-as men who should know will tell you-who knows as much or a little more about the botany of Loudon than any other man. Dr. Stevenson, Mr. Melmoth Althouse and Mr. Samuel Baker, the last two named public

school principals, also find the study fascinating. It's a very peculiar thing, but such is the case, that among the bogs in the region of London botanists will find in one the flora of this district, while in a neighboring bog the flora of the far north. And migratory birds from the north always seek out the ponds with their native flora. There are two very fruitful sources of new plants in the world of flora-the railway tracks and river beds. Why the former should be so is easily understood, with so much foreign

travel in freight and passenger cars. Mr. Bowman recently discovered something entirely new to this locality-an insectiverous plant-utricularia. Its roots form little traps which hold fast the animalcu'æ, on the decomposition of which it subsists. Mr. Dearness' recent find of the obnoxious Russian tumbling weed has already been made known through the press. He recently brought down a very rare cream violet from Port Frank. Mr. Bowman found many specimens at Bala, Muskoka, that local botanists consider The prisoner had been given a fair trial, and a most patient inquiry was made into It is a fodder product from Colorado. and has become so much at home as to be discovered in three or four parts of the city at the same time. It has been reported in Canada before, but not in this city. A new geranium has made its appearance-geranium Molle. Mr. Balkwell discovered it and since then it has been found in all directions. It is a very pretty plant and worthy of cultivation. The members of the society notice with apprehension the growth of the chicory plant among the different farms. It promises to become a great pest unless farmers get to know it and weed it out. It was originally planted in the States for the sake of the product, but runs wild here. It is two or three feet high

and of straggling growth. The birr grass or grass birr has appeared for the first time. It is a good deal like the clot birr in appearance but cannot be handled without pain. Mr. Balkwell has discovered a new clover. It is in size and formation like the small white clover but of a bright red color. There is no doubt but what it comes from a foreign country. A new wayside plant-spargula-is also credited to Mr. Balkwell's keen search. A product of the last few years, the new verbena-bracteosa-has lately become very common in the sandy soil of East London. A new blue-solored flowerviper buglos - is fast becoming a pest and painting uncultivated landscapes a bright blue. Its appearance along the railway tracks suggests the route by which it reached this part of the world. President Beadle, of the Toronto Horticultural Society, was in London recently examining its flora to see how much would be good for cultivation as natural flowers. wanted a specimen of the great fringed gentian, but returned without it. This beautiful flower looks just like a piece of blue sky clipped from the firmament. It is generally to be found around London.

BEATON VS. BRIERLY.

Compromise Verdict in a Notable

Libel Suit. The Plaintiff Secures a Verdict of \$1 Damages.

HAMILTON, Oct. 10 .- At the Assize Court before Judge Falconbridge this afternoon the libel suit of Beaton vs. Brierly was concluded. This was one of a series of suits brought by Mrs. Elizabeth Beaton, of Burlington, against several newspapers for publishing an article taken from a New York paper in August, 1893, regarding the mysterious disappearance of a wealthy gentleman named Cicero Harrison Case, who was lost overboard from the old Dominion Liner Guyandotte, on a voyage from South Carolina to New York. A woman who claimed to be a daughter of Case was with him on the steamer and she was suspected of knowing more about Case's

death than she would divulge. This woman by the name of Mrs. Oliver disappeared soon after the arrival of the steamer. A reporter of a New York paper started out to hunt her up and claims he recognized in Mrs. Beaton, of Burlington, the same woman who accompanied Case on

with him. Mrs. Beaton filed papers and rested the case in her lawyer's hands. Mr. Brierly defended himself and made an eloquent address in which he stated that he had received the matter from a concern in Toronto, which furnished news all set up, and had it published in the usual way. As soon as he received notice from Mrs. Beaton's solicitor, he made a retraction

and published it through the journal. The jury returned a verdict of \$1 and costs for plaintill. It is understood the verdict was a compromise one, seven of the jurors being strongly in favor of a verdict for the defense.
