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FATHER FLANNERY

The G. T. R. President Pays a Visit to Goderich.

Good Prospects for the Lake Town—The O. P. R.'s American Traffic.

The speed attained by the Philadelphia-Atlantic City flyer on the initial run this season was an average of 73.53 miles an hour. Last season it was 68.25.

The Canadian Pacific Railway earned \$1,200,000 on its American traffic last year, the net profit being 15 per cent. The expenditures for supplies in the United States during the same time were \$2,500,000.

The Grand Trunk Railway has recently added to its equipment some large and powerful passenger locomotives of the 10-wheel type, which type of engine is coming to be very generally used for fast and heavy passenger service.

At a meeting of the president and officials of the Vanderbilt line, held at the Grand Central depot, it has been agreed finally to consolidate all the various fast freight lines operating over the different roads in the Vanderbilt system into two. A clearing house will be established at Buffalo to audit all accounts and claims for Buffalo new lines. As fast as practicable all the agencies west of Chicago and St. Louis will be consolidated.

Sudden Demise of a Tweed Farmer.

THE GOOD HARVEST.

"In the first place, the harvest again promises to be excellent. It is true that all European harvests likewise promise well, and we hope that Australia and Argentina will also have good crops. Therefore it is reasonable to expect that there will be a considerable fall in the price of wheat. Consequently the United States in the future will benefit from cheap bread, and so a stimulus will be given to general trade.

CUBA TO BE DEVELOPED.

"Over and above this, it is to be recollected that Cuba is one of the richest islands in the world naturally; that it has been grievously neglected while under Spanish rule, and that America, with her superior enterprise and enterprise and boldness, will throw themselves into the task of developing the natural resources of the island in a way that will also have employment to great masses of capital, and that the consequent stimulus given to every kind of industry in Cuba will react upon the United States.

"Furthermore, Porto Rico will have to be brought up to the American level, and wherever acquisition the United States makes in the Pacific will likewise call for a large outlay of capital.

"Lastly, the new position taken by the United States in the world makes it incumbent upon the government to largely augment its fleet. Therefore large additions of first-class ships of the newest type will have to be made, and that implies a considerable government outlay.

The army likewise will have to be increased, which again means an additional government outlay.

"For all these reasons, and others that might be mentioned, it is reasonably expected that the United States will actively trade in the United States as well as much business on the Stock Exchange, and higher prices in both."
