Vienna, May 26.-Gen. Franz Kuhn, army, died today at Cervignano. Gen. Kuhn was born July 15, 1817. He entered the infantry in 1837. He took part in the campaigns in Italy and Hungary (1848-9). He distinguished himself at the siege of Komorn. During the campaign in Italy he was chief of the staff of the army of Gen. Gyulay. In 1867 he was promoted to be field marshal. Queen Viotoria and Prince Albert were married in the Chapel Royal, St. James' Palace, in 1840, and the marriage was a most happy one. Husband and wife were devoted to each other, and no breath of scandal ever touched the reputation of either. Prince Albert never caused the Queen one moment's pang of jealousy, nor did he attempt to interfere in the politics of the country.
