Washington, Aug. 24.-The forthcoming annual report of the bureau of statistics will show the total valuation of the imports and domestic exports of the United States by countries for the year ending June 30, 1897. The largest trade was done with Great Britain, the imports aggregating \$167.947.820 and the exports \$478.448.592. Next in volume was Germany, the imports being \$110,210,614, and the exports \$123,784,453. France is third, with ports amounting to \$67,530,231, and exports \$56,257,631. The imports from the Dominion of Canada during the year amounted to

\$40,390,347, and the exports \$58,465,048.

The percentage of the trade of the Inited States with foreign countries during the last year is given in part as follows: Great Britain—Imports, 21.96; ex orts, 45.97 Germany-Imports, 14.57; exports


