IN A DEATH TRAP

Ten Persons Perish in a Tenement House Fire.

Six More Injured—Some of Them Can not Recover.

New York, June 15.—Ten lives were lost, and six people were badly injured during a fire which almost totally destroyed the old five-story tenement, 34 Jackson street, early today.

The following is a list of the dead: Louis Marion, 40 years old, and his three children, Albert, Elsie and Emma; William Cotter, and his wife, Kate, and their four children, Mamie, Jacob, Kate and John.

The Cotter family occupied apartments on the fourth floor, and the Marion family lived on the floor above them. The two families apparently were asleep and were not aware of their danger until too late to effect an escape.

Louis Marion was killed by jumping from a window. When the firemen reached the apartments of the family, three of the family were dead on the floor and the others unconscious.

In the Cotter rooms was found Mrs. Cotter, while a few feet away lay the body of Mr. Cotter with a dead child under him. In other parts of the rooms were found the remaining members of the family. Only two of them escaped alive. But for the heroic behavior of the police and firemen many more lives would have been lost. The monetary loss caused by the fire is slight.

Giving Up

Klerksdorp Submits to General Hunter's Force.

Cronje's Son Surrenders—Attack on One of Gen. Kitchener's Construction Trains Repulsed.

London, June 15.—The war office has issued the following dispatch from Lord Roberts:

"Pretoria, Presidency, June 14—10:40 p.m.—Klerksdorp surrendered on June 9 to an armed party, sent on by Gen. Hunter.

"A messenger from Klerksdorp reports that Cronje, who commanded there, determined to surrender as soon as he knew for certain that Pretoria was in our possession. His example has been copied by many in the neighborhood. The court house is now said to be full of arms.

"Gen. Kitchener reports that the Boers attacked a reconstruction train early this morning a few miles north of the Rhenoster River. He sent out mounted troops and drove off the enemy before they could do damage. One man was killed and eleven were wounded, including two officers."

IT WAS CRONJE'S SON WHO SURRENDERED.

London, June 15.—By the peaceful occupation of Klerksdorp, announced by Lord Roberts, the British have gained a terminus of another railroad to Johannesburg, but it is within easy reach of the Kromstad and Nierfontein Railroad. The Cronje who surrendered the place is a son of the famous Gen. Cronje, now a prisoner at St. Helena. The former was prominent during the siege of Mafeking.

Apart from the fact that Lord Roberts' dispatch comes direct from Pretoria, showing the

TELEGRAPH LINE IS REOPENED, a point of interest is the fact that the Boers whom Gen. Methuen was reported to have so utterly routed have sufficiently recuperated to attack a reconstruction train.

A dispatch from Kimberley reports the capture of the well-known pugilist, Jim Holway, who was an adjutant in the Boer army, and who blew up the bridge at Fourteen Streams.

It is feared at Cape Town that the parliamentary deadlock will probably lead to a temporary suspension of legislation. Sir John Gordon Sprigg is experiencing much difficulty in forming a cabinet. Mr. Schreiner refusing to support a ministry dominated by Mr. Cecil Rhodes.

Major W. C. Macdonald is to command the 8th Regiment, Highlanders, Toronto, vice Lieut.-Col. A. H. Crosby, deceased.

The Aymer, Que., creamery this week received an order from Liverpool for 22,400 pounds of butter, to be shipped in 56-lb. cases.

A Victoria, B. C., telegram says: In the official recount Gilmour's majority over Charles Wilson is increased to 22. The case will now go before a judge.

Work on the woodware establishment and planing mill of E. B. Eddy & Co., of Hull, will commence at once. The building will be a three-story one.

At the Toronto Anglican Synod this morning the bishop, in the course of the debate in the value of church entertainments as a means of raising money, strongly deprecated raffish and similar methods.

The Princess Arlberg spent Thursday morning driving around Toronto, and visited the city hall and parliament building. The princess will pay an extended visit to the Governor-General and Lady Minto.

The body of a boy, found in the Lachine Canal at Montreal, has been identified as the 12-year-old son of Thomas Sonne, tent and awning manufacturer. He played truant from school and was drowned.

In the case of the Dominion Express Company vs. Stinson, at St. Catharines, Stinson, who won, charged with the theft of two money packages while in the employ of the company last December, was found not guilty.

The Norwegian steamer Antarctic, with the Danish East Greenland expedition, commanded by Lieut. Ambrup, sailed from Copenhagen Thursday morning to explore the coast between Cape Brewster and Agga Island.

MAY BE BURNED!

Tien Tsin Threatened with Destruction—Boxers Destroying Bridges—Rain in India.

Tien Tsin, June 14.—Railroad communication between this place and Admiral Seymour's international force has been cut three miles behind Yang Tsun. Two bridges have been destroyed.

It is rumored that the Boxers are determined to burn Tien Tsin station tonight.

At Yokohama the opposition press is impatient over the inactivity of the government. The emperor has summoned Marquis Ito to consult with him in reference to the situation in China.

Paris, June 15.—At a cabinet council today the minister of foreign affairs, M. Delcasse, announced that the telegraph line to Peking had again been cut. The latest dispatch from the French minister there was dated the evening of June 12, and said the Chinese government had informed him it would not oppose the foreign troops entering Peking. A swift, first-class cruiser has been ordered to Taku.

RAIN IN INDIA.
Calcutta, June 15.—Rain fell continuously in the Darjeeling district for three days, ceasing at 4 o'clock this morning. Several slight landslides occurred.

MRS. GLADSTONE'S DEATH.
London, June 15.—Mrs. Gladstone, who had been unconscious about 72 hours, died without recovering consciousness. The news was immediately conveyed to the Queen, the Prince of Wales, the Dean of Westminster, the Dean of Lincoln, Sir William Vernon Harcourt, Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, Mr. Arthur J. Balfour and others. In the course of the evening Master William Gladstone, heir to Hawarden, arrived from Eton, shortly followed by two sister from London. The bells of Hawarden Church rang muffled peals. By courtesy of the Dean of Westminster, and in accordance with the arrangements made in 1898, the funeral will be held in the abbey. The interment will probably take place on June 19, being of as private a character as possible.

CABLE NOTES.
The United States legation at Constantinople has not yet received a reply to the note regarding the indemnity question handed to the porte on May 21. Mr. Lloyd C. Griscom, United States charge d'affaires, is pressing for a solution of the matter.

EIGHT KILLED

Disaster in an Alberta Mine—Eight Men Dead and Several Injured.

Canmore, Alberta, June 15.—The most serious gas explosion that ever occurred in Canmore mine took place Wednesday afternoon, resulting in the instant death of eight men and several slightly injured. The names of the dead are: Prosper Dye, Amand Regar, Tony Bokima, Peter Caulfield, and three others, whose names are yet unknown. The first three leave large families. The cause is supposed to be due to one of the miners, who lost his life, unlocking his safety lamp with a key wrongfully obtained.
