BUDGET DEBATE IN THE LEGISLATURE

Still in Progress—Province Urged to Build the Temiscaming Railway.

Toronto, Feb. 6.—The debate on the budget was resumed in the legislature yesterday by Mr. Hoyle for the opposition. Mr. Hoyle moved the following amendment: "That this house desires to express its regret that the government has taken no steps to discover and bring to trial the person or persons who destroyed or removed from the vault of the parliament buildings the box containing the ballots and other papers relating to the election in the west riding of the county of Elgin, held in January, 1899; and also regrets the declaration of the government that no steps will be taken to discover and bring to trial such person or persons."

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BOER LOSSES ARE HEAVY!

Guerilla Warfare Proving Very Disastrous to the Burghers.

British Patrol Missing—Kitchener's Scouts Killed—To Stop Enlisting Yeomanry.

Pretoria, March 5.—Carefully compiled statistics of Boer losses show that the present system of guerilla warfare is proving very disastrous to the enemy. Their losses in killed and wounded and prisoners for January amounted to just over 1,000, while 1,600 have been accounted for in February. For January the number of the killed by actual count was over 200, and 98 were taken prisoners. The figures for wounded are taken from estimates checked by prisoners. Commandant-General Botha recently sent in a list of his losses approximating to our figures, with a request that it should be published for the information of relatives of his men. This knowledge, however, is concealed from the burghers on command.

BRITISH PATROL MISSING.

Somerset, South Africa, March 5.—A British patrol of seven men, sent out from this place, is missing. Boer raiders have probably captured them. Lord Kitchener having changed his base of supplies to Port Elizabeth, according to recent dispatches, because of the prevalence of the plague at Cape Town, this sign of Boer raiders near Somerset is important. It indicates the Boers are trying to interfere with the British line of supplies between Port Elizabeth and the north.

SCOUTS KILLED.

London, March 5.—A list of casualties issued by the war office yesterday shows that there have been several small but sharp fights in South Africa recently. Four of Gen. Kitchener's Scouts were killed and sixteen wounded, near Richmond, Cape Colony, on Feb. 27, when the balance surrendered.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Canada Will Contribute to the Pacific Cable Construction.

The Paris Exposition—Praises for Canada's Exhibit—Many Others Coming Here.

Ottawa, March 5.—This afternoon the House of Commons, in committee, adopted unanimously the resolution of the postmaster-general authorizing the payment of the increased amount which Canada is required to contribute towards the Pacific cable under the revised estimate, based upon the contract which has been given for the work. The postmaster-general said that the cable would be completed by the end of December, 1902. The house went into committee of supply, and the remainder of the day was spent in discussing the estimates of the public works department and the estimate of \$30,000 required to wind up the accounts in connection with the Paris exhibition, under which the whole of the expenditure at Paris was criticised by the opposition.

THURSDAYS FOR GOVERNMENT.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier moved that government orders have preference on Thursdays; that the remainder of the session. In speaking to the motion Sir Wilfrid said he had to inform the house that business the government has so far as is strictly before the house, and which it was intended to introduce. The bills to amend the franchise act, 1898, and the Dominion Land Act, would probably be introduced tomorrow. An act would be introduced regarding the alien labor law.

PACIFIC CABLE RESOLUTION.

The house then went into committee upon the following motion by Sir Mulock: "That whereas by the Pacific cable act, 1895, his excellency in council is authorized to guarantee payment of five-eighths of the principal sum of one million seven hundred thousand pounds sterling to be applied in establishing direct submarine telegraphic communication between Canada and Australasia; and whereas, in lieu of said sum of one million seven hundred thousand pounds, it is estimated that for the purpose aforesaid there will be a sum not exceeding two million pounds sterling, which sum of two million pounds the government of the United Kingdom is willing to advance; therefore be it resolved (1) that the government-in-council is authorized to guarantee payment of five-eighths parts of the principal and interest of and upon the securities to be issued by the government of the United Kingdom for raising the said sum, namely, two million pounds, so to be advanced; (2) that section three of said act be repealed."

MR. MULOCK EXPLAINS.

Speaking to the resolution Mr. Mulock said: This resolution to some extent changes the financial scheme, as authorized by the Dominion act of 1895. Under that act power was given to his excellency the governor-in-council to assume as our share five-eighths of the total liability, which was limited to £1,700,000 sterling. It has since been ascertained, as a result of actual invitations for tenders, that the cost of the cable will exceed somewhat that amount, and it is es-

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
