INDEMNIFYING THE LOSERS.

British Columbia Scalers Get \$100,334 From the Dominion Government.

VICTORIA, B. C., April 22.—Collector of Customs Milne has received from Ottawa a statement of the indemnity awarded to sealers to compensate them for losses sustained last year. Owing to the operations of the modus vivendiclaims were made by 44 sealers, but allowances were made to only 44 sealers, but allowances were made to only 25. The claims of elevensealers were reduced because it was shown that their earnings covered the outlay of their owners. The owners, captains, mates and crews of the 25 schooners received a total of \$96,434 for losses. In addition each schooner, including the thirteen rejected, is allowed \$100 for expenses incurred in preparing its case. This makes a grand total of \$100,334. The apportionments vary in sums from \$200 to \$10,000. The bulk of the money goes to the owners, they being the chief losers. Mon Tied to the Seat.
