HAMILTON'S FRIENDS NOT SURE THAT HE IS DEAD

Relatives of Unfortunate Englishman Make Inquiry.

Only Rumors of His Death Here Have Reached Them.

Copies of The Advertiser Have Been Mailed and Soon They Will Learn the Truth.

Chief of Police Williams last week received from Beaminster, Dorset, England, a letter making inquiry as to the fate of Henry Hamilton, the Englishman who died suddenly while driving in a buggy in this city on Feb. 23 of the present year. According to the letter, only vague rumors of Hamilton's fate had reached his old home there, and the writer of the letter, impelled by an interest in Hamilton's relatives and by the fact that the dead man was a brother Freemason, communicated with Chief Williams for the purpose of obtaining accurate and authentic information. The chief handed the letter to The Advertiser, and as a result copies of The Advertiser, covering two weeks, and containing full accounts of Hamilton's death and burial, and the coroner's inquest which investigated the case, were mailed at once. Brook Villa, Thortmoor, Beaminster, Dorset.

Sir,—There is a persistent rumor in England that Henry Hamilton, the eldest son of Mr. John Hamilton (who has passed in Canada under the name of St. Clair), has died in Canada under tragic circumstances, i.e., found dead in a buggy early in March this year. I trust you will pardon a stranger writing to you to ask if there is really any truth in the report or not. I have already written to Mr. Cox, proprietor of the Dominion Hotel, London, Ont., but have not had a word in reply. I and others also are very anxious to know if he is dead, also how he died, and if suddenly, the truth in the matter, and fervently hope my anxiety will be considered by you an apology for troubling you. TOOK THEIR LIGHT AWAY

North-Enders Air Grievance Before No. 3 Committee.

Firemen Favor Establishment of Benefit Association.

"There are no funds in our estimates for lights this year," was No. 3 committee's answer to a number of rate-payers who came before them with a protest which arose over the moving of an electric light, which until last week stood for years at the corner of Regent and Waterloo streets. The deputation claimed that the vicinity of the corner where the light formerly stood is among the most dangerous in the city, the road being rough and the ditching deep. For a distance of three of four blocks there are no lights, and to make it worse, no sidewalks.

"Those people might just as well live in the country for all the benefit they derive from the city," an official remarked.

Messrs. Robert Fraser and Joseph Connors spoke for the citizens who have a kick coming. In emphatic tones they asked for what reason the light had been taken away. The streets were in bad shape, and in winter-time were impassable for heavily-laden vehicles.

"We cannot see you way clear to do anything for you," said Chairman Winnett. "The light was moved to where it is now for the reason that the spot is particularly dangerous, and because of the ravine which runs along Wellington street near Regent."

The committee, however, recognized the justice of the deputation's contention, and promised to reconsider the matter.

Next year's committee had better put a good item in their estimates for lighting," said Ald. McMechan.

Chief Roe, on behalf of the city firemen, reported that the plan proposing a benevolent association for the men of the brigade had been discussed by the men. While they appeared willing to form such a society, they would like a little more time to inquire into the system, which was in vogue elsewhere. The chief had written to other firemen's aid societies, and they are in existence to ascertain the degree of success which they had met with.

The committee decided to report progress, and the matter was laid over till next meeting.

The contract for wiring the three fire halls and the big chandler in the city was awarded to the Electric Construction Company at \$133, which was the lowest figure submitted.

R. D. Purdy, of Glendale, was given the honor for saying the plan proposed in the five stalls in the fish market. His price for the five floors was \$68.

"The matter of deciding whether the eastern veranda of the market house should be pulled down was referred to the chairman. The question has been in the committee's hands for some time. Instructions were given to the engineer."

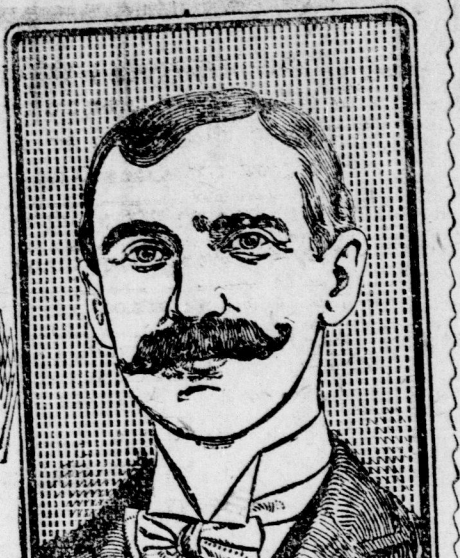

WILL ECLIPSE PREVIOUS YEARS

Sensational Attractions for the Western Fair.

HAIR-RAISING CYCLE WHIRL

Thrilling Parachute Drop, Champion Zone Drill and Many Other Good Acts.

When the Western Fair opens its gates this year, those attending it will be assured of enjoying perhaps the finest exhibition of the many successful ones which stand to the credit of London and the fair board. Entries and applications for space have been pouring in, until it seems probable that even the generous space at the disposal of the exhibitors will be exhausted. Many improvements and alterations are being made to the grounds and buildings, and the park never looked more attractive than it will next month.

In no department will there be more improvement over former years than in the amusements, which are provided each afternoon in front of the grand stand, for the delectation of the thousands who annually make a Mecca of the Western Fair. Secretary Neiles promises that in point of novelty and pleasing quality, this year's programme will eclipse by far any ever offered here before.

The three leading attractions booked are guaranteed to lead the world in their respective lines. Probably the most sensational act ever seen in this city will be witnessed in the cycle whirl, performed by the famous troupe organized by Tom Eck, whose name has been for years a familiar one in connection with the bicycle world. Unlike the cycle whirl recently seen here, the bicycles will be driven by motor power instead of by the riders themselves, adding immeasurably to the dangerous and thrilling nature of the exhibition. The track upon which the five bicyclists perform at once is virtually a perpendicular one, being 18 1/2 feet in diameter at the bottom and 21 at the top. The enormous centrifugal force generated as the riders whirl around at a speed of 30 miles an hour keeps them in a literally horizontal position. One of the riders is Miss Lotie Brandon, champion short and long distance rider of the world, who holds the mile record of 1:46. Miss Brandon last week went after the female record for an hour's riding, and got it. She covered over 33 miles in the 60 minutes and more than eight miles better than the previous mark. Other members of the company are Stone and Judge, famous racers, and Armstrong, a daring and clever trick rider.

Another big attraction will be the Streator Zouaves, the champion fancy drill team of America, and the originators and performers of the square drill. They hold the world's record for scaling a 20 foot blank wall.

Another sensational act is furnished by Professor Hutchinson's balloon ascent and parachute drop. Professor Hutchinson makes the ascent inclosed in a gigantic bomb, whose explosion at a dizzy height releases him and his parachute and allows them to drop to mother earth again.
