Lady Maccabees to Establish Order in Old Country.

Detroit, July 25.—The ladies of the Maccabees of the World have decided to start immediately upon the extension of the order into Great Britain. It will be organized in England, on the Ladies of the Maccabees of the World, British branch, Miss Jessie K. Ackerman, London, Eng., will be national commander, and Miss Ada Murrett, of London, England, national record keeper. The society will be organized the same as that in this country, except that the funds will be deposited in the Bank of England to the credit of the Ladies of the Maccabees of the World. They will be drawn by the supreme commander, Miss Murrett, from New York on the 25th inst., for England. She will join Miss Ackerman and immediately enter upon the work.

ROYALTY'S DOINGS

His Majesty and Queen Put in a Busy Week.

New York, July 25.—A special cable to the New York Herald from London says: "King Edward and Queen Alexandra have been working harder than most of their subjects during the last week. Starting on Monday, London on Tuesday morning, they traveled to Liverpool, where the King laid the foundation stone of the new cathedral, leaving late in the afternoon on the yacht Victoria and Albert for Swansea, where, on Wednesday, after receiving numerous addresses, his majesty cut the first sod of the new King's dock, to cover sixty-six acres. After visiting Penrice Castle, the King and Queen returned to the yacht, and on Thursday visited the Welsh village of Rhayader, for the purpose of performing the ceremony of turning on the new supply of water for Birmingham, leaving for London in the evening. Saturday the King and Queen visited Westminster, where they opened the Royal Horticultural Society's new hall, afterward leaving for Goodwood. The Prince of Wales has caused a pleasant stir among sportsmen by his decision to go in for horse-racing. He will breed every horse he runs. A

NEW MYSTERIES OF HUMAN MIND

Rider Haggard Raises the Question of Telepathy Between Men and Animals.

London, July 25.—Rider Haggard, the novelist, has raised the interesting question of telepathic communication between men and animals in a long letter to the *Illustrated London News*. He describes to the effect that on the night of July 9 his wife roused him from a nightmare, a dream that a black retriever dog belonging to his eldest daughter was lying dead in water beside some brushwood. The dog was trying to speak to him and, failing, tried to kill him with its teeth. The next night the dog was missed. Four days later it was discovered in a river a mile away. It evidently had been killed by a train on a railway bridge. Other evidence shows that it was killed at exactly the hour of his nightmare.

Rider Haggard does not attempt to explain the phenomenon, which is being considered by the Society for Psychical Research.

Another novelist Mrs. Campbell Praed, is also puzzling the occultists by averring that she has received "Nyrja," a revelation of a young unmarried woman who remembers her previous existence, which years ago as a martyr under Domitian, sitting together in a hotel in a foreign country. Mrs. Praed held the girl's hand, and the girl would go into the sort of dream existence. She assumed a different identity and spoke of scenes and events of which she had not the slightest recollection when she returned to normal consciousness.

By chance during one of these dreams the girl, sinking back in the chair with her eyes closed, told an amazing tale about experiences in a former existence.

"The girl," says Mrs. Campbell Praed, "was Nyrja, and the story is Nyrja's, not mine. I could not have invented it, could not have supplied the detail and local color, which experts pronounce perfect. She knows no language but Bay's Rhodes, with some English, and accuracy the titles of various princes and functionaries about the court."
