

A B. C. MAN HEADS MANUFACTURERS' ASSN.

Annual Convention at Hamilton
Concludes With Election
of Officers

Hamilton, Sept. 16.—The Canadian Manufacturers' Association in convention here wound up its session to-day with the elections.

Mr. John Henry, head of the British Columbia Mills, Timber and Trading Company, Vancouver, B. C., was elected president. The other officers elected were:

Considerable business was dealt with before adjourning. The commercial intelligence committee urged that the publication of inquiries from British and foreign houses in the weekly bulletin be discontinued, as Canadian money should not be used to furnish free advertising to outsiders where the object was to displace Canadians in their own market.

The clause in the report proposing the establishment of an interchange credit bureau by which the department would be in a position to answer promptly inquiries as to the standing of any firm, provoked discussion. Some delegates thought the association should desist from such detail as mentioned in the report. A motion to that effect was amended on the suggestion of Mr. Lee, of Toronto, by which the detail will be discouraged, but larger matters will receive consideration.

The revival of the "made-in-Canada campaign" provoked considerable discussion. Some of the delegates condemned the scheme because the association would require nearly \$200,000 to work it out.

J. P. Murray strongly advocated the scheme on the ground that Canadian children should be educated to support Canadian industries.

Mr. Sparks denounced the project as a sentimental one.

Mr. Murray said in some stores 75 per cent of the goods were American, and he thought it was time some scheme was launched to educate Canadians to insist on Canadian goods.

C. R. McCulloch, Hamilton, suggested that it would be wise to make exhibits in Toronto and other centres. The scheme was, however, ignored.

Resolutions were passed as follows:
Thanking Canadian shippers for securing bill of lading aiding small shippers, and urging several provinces to have uniform boiler regulations; asking that Government pass no pure food legislation until after 1910; requesting Government to at once order thorough inquiry into decline of growth in Canadian wool industry, and in view of many failures to devise schemes to foster growing of wool; endorsing Quebec Government's action prohibiting the export of pulpwood and logs; requesting Dominion Government to pass similar legislation; urging a number of changes in duty on shingles and lumber in view of recent U. S. legislation; urging the Dominion Government to extend substantial encouragement to shipbuilding.

**RICHEST TORONTO SITE
WAS ONCE A GIFT**

Toronto, Ont., Sept. 17.—A remarkable fact has been brought to light in connection with the transfer of the Lawlor Building, corner King and Yonge streets, to the Manufacturers' Life.

The site, which is the most valuable in the city, sold for \$500,000, and is the first sale of the property since the original patent which was granted by the crown to a sailor who gave it to Lawlor when dying as a parting gift. Mrs. Lawlor owned the property and she is living in Germany with her daughter, Baroness von Baseler.

ON THE ROCKS.

Iroquois, Ont., Sept. 17.—The steamer "Hebron" from Quebec for Quebec loaded with coal, struck on the rocks in the Galop Rapids, just below Prescott early this morning. The captain tried to head the steamer to Iroquois, but she sank just at the head of Point Iroquois, about one mile above the dock.

HARRIMAN'S MILLIONS LEFT TO HIS WIDOW

In Brief Testament He Leaves
Everything Absolutely to
Mrs. Harriman.

New York, Sept. 17.—All of Edward H. Harriman's property, real and personal, is bequeathed without restrictions of any sort to the widow, Mary W. Harriman. The will was filed at Goshen, N. Y., this afternoon, but was not published in this city. It is an extremely brief document, dated June 8, 1903, and reads as follows:

"I, Edward H. Harriman, of Arden in the state of New York, do make, publish and declare this as and for my last will and testament, that is to say—I give, devise and bequeath all my property, real and personal of every kind and nature, to my wife, Mary W. Harriman, to be hers absolutely and forever and I do hereby nominate and appoint the said Mary W. Harriman to be executrix of this will. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal, this 8th day of June, in the year nineteen hundred and three.

(Signed) "EDWARD H. HARRIMAN," declared by the testator as for his last will and testament, in our presence, who, at his request and in his presence and in the presence of each other, have each of us hereunto subscribed our names as witnesses.

(Signed) "CHARLES A. PEABODY, C. C. TEGERTHOFF," Mr. Peabody, who made the will, was one of Mr. Harriman's secretaries.

Mr. Peabody, who made will public, declined to make any statement as to the value of Mr. Harriman's estate.

MAY BE BURGLAR.

Quebec, Que., Sept. 17.—A stranger who gave his name as Gordon, and later on as Wilson, and who is supposed to be one of the worst bank burglars in this country, was arrested Walsh, assisted by Detective Dwyer and Constable Lacasse. He is thought to have been connected with the recent bank robbery at Yamachiche.

LIBERAL PICNIC.

Toronto, Ont., Sept. 17.—Hon. G. P. Graham, minister of railways and canals, Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King, minister of labor, and Hon. Charles Murphy, secretary of state, passed through the city this morning on their way to the Liberal picnic at Schomberg. A number of local Liberals accompanied them north on a special car on the Metropolitan Railway. Tomorrow night the ministers will speak at a banquet of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association at Hamilton.

TROUBLE AT McKEE'S ROCKS

Foreigners of Steel Mill Are Once
More on Strike.

Pittsburg, Sept. 17.—Violence and disorder, such as characterized the last trouble, marked the new strike today at the plant of the Pressed Steel Car Co. at McKee's Rocks. A large number of men were roughly handled, street cars were compelled to stop running between McKee's Rocks and Schoenerville and within a few hours after daylight, everything was at a standstill. The strikers to the number of several thousand, were stationed at the Donovan Bridge and along Nichol avenue and George street, the scene of the fatal riot, August 22.

Since the settlement of the strike a week ago, a majority of the foreigners have affiliated themselves with the Industrial Workers of the World. Leaders of the organization say these men will return to work when assured they would be given better treatment.

ALDERMAN SUES

Says That He Was Libelled Before
Royal Commission.

Montreal, Que., Sept. 17.—Alderman Lariviere has entered an action for \$25,000 damages against W. McLeod Walbank, vice-president of the Montreal Light, Heat and Power Co. The case arising out of Walbank's statement before the royal commission which recently inquired into the city's government, that Lariviere demanded \$10,000 for himself and nine other aldermen to support the company's tender for city lighting a few years ago.

BALLOON WARFARE ENTHUSES KAISER

Emperor Delighted With Manoeuvres of Dirigible Cross II.

Mergentheim, Wurtemberg, Sept. 17.—Surrounded by a brilliant company, including the king of Wurtemberg, the grand dukes of Baden and Hesse, Archduke Francis Ferdinand, Winston Spencer Churchill, the earl of Lonsdale and Captain Samuel G. Shuttleworth, United States military attaché, Emperor William yesterday morning witnessed the dramatic appearance of the military dirigibles Cross II, which emerged from the clouds overhanging the valley of the Tauber. Those on board the airship were spying out the position of the Red army and transmitting their observations by wireless to headquarters many miles in the rear.

The emperor watched with his field glasses every turn of the airship, which answered the helm gracefully. The Emperor spent six hours on a hill top following the development of the first decisive engagement between the Red and Blue armies. He partook with his guests of the hot luncheon served from the cuirassiers' traveling kitchen, as the imperial automobile kitchen was unable to climb the steep hill.

The troops are responding splendidly to the demands made upon them. There have been few casualties. In spite of the wet weather, the emperor was so delighted with the performance of the Cross II, that he sent a message to Count Zeppelin to come to the manoeuvres from Frankfurt the Zeppelin II.

MUTUAL LIQUIDATION.

Toronto, Sept. 16.—Mr. E. R. C. Clarkson, who in March last was appointed liquidator by the courts to wind up the business interests in Canada of the Mutual Reserve Life Insurance Company of New York, which made an assignment early last year, is reaching the end of his labors.

There are about 3,000 policyholders in Canada representing a risk of \$336,000. On this amount a dividend of 80 per cent has been paid to policyholders, and a further dividend of not less than 10 per cent will be declared as soon as some of the adjustments can be made.

The policyholders in the United States have not yet received anything from the American liquidators, whose lists have not yet been completed. The dividend was based on the

value of the paid-up reserve to the Government. There are about 200 policyholders in Toronto.

SUES COMPANY.

Montreal, Que., Sept. 17.—George J. Ellis has entered an action for \$5,299.50 damages for false arrest against the Atlantic, Quebec and Western Railroad. He was employed by the company at New Carlisle, Que., was charged with the robbery of \$1,200, but after being kept in jail for a year, was honorably acquitted.

QUIT THE FEDERATION.

Detroit, Sept. 16.—The Detroit Federation of Labor last night withdrew from the American Federation of Labor by voting unanimously not to comply with the recent order of the executive council to secede the Electrical Workers' Union. The matter will be appealed to the American Federation convention at Toronto in November. The electrical workers' local union is affiliated with the United Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, which is not recognized by the American Federation.
