

GRIP THIEF CAUGHT WITH STOLEN GOODS!

J. Corrin, of 425 Bathurst St., Neatly Run Down by P. C. Fysh.

STOLE VALISE
AT G. T. R. DEPOT

Prisoner Is a Young Man—
Remanded for Trial On
Three Counts.

P. C. Fysh made a clever arrest last night, when he placed John Corrin, a young man employed at Leonard's, and residing at 425 Bathurst street, in the cells on a charge of stealing grips at different times from the local railway stations.

At the police court this morning, Mayor Beattie, after hearing the evidence, committed Corrin for trial on three charges, and Attorney McKillop stated that there would be nothing done in the fourth.

Last night when Mr. Frank Lawson, of London, came in on the C. P. R. train from Toronto, he had occasion to go into the waiting-room for a few minutes, and left his overcoat and valise on the floor.

When he returned a few minutes later he found both articles gone.

Alleged Thief Was Arrested.

Fortunately for Mr. Lawson, Howard Jones and his brother, Chester, two youths who came over from Detroit to see the fair, were standing there, and at once gave Mr. Lawson a description of the man whom they had seen pick up the grip and coat.

The police were notified, and in a very short time P. C. Fysh took Corrin into custody in the Waipar House.

In court this morning both the James boys identified him positively as the man whom they saw take the things.

Property Identified.

After Corrin had been arrested, Detective Eglinton went down to the prisoner's home and in his room found two suitcases.

In one of them was a quantity of articles which Mr. William Mountjoy, of The Advertiser, identified as belonging to him.

Mr. Mountjoy said he left his grip on a seat for a few minutes last Saturday in the G. T. R. waiting-room. He noticed a man sitting in the adjoining seat.

Corrin, he said, was the man, and when Mr. Mountjoy came back his valise was gone.

Sent for Trial.

Detective Eglinton stated that Corrin had told him that after his arrest he had been taken by him at the C. P. R. station on Saturday, Sept. 10. It is thought to belong to James Hewson, of Appleton.

Corrin was sent for trial on three separate charges of theft. He is a boiler-maker, and previous to his arrest was employed at Leonard's. Bail was refused.

**DON'T CARE MUCH FOR
RENOMINATION—TAFT**

And Intimates That Only One
Republican Can Be Elected
Next Time.

New York, Sept. 15.—The New York Times tomorrow will print the following dispatch under a Beverly date:

"I am not thinking of 1912; in fact, I don't know what I am going to do. From the way things are drifting, it may be that no Republican can be elected, save possibly one."

"From a trustworthy source the New York Times' correspondent learns that this was the statement President Taft made several weeks ago to a friend with whom he was discussing the political outlook for 1912. From an entirely different source the correspondent is informed that President Taft made substantially the same remark to another friend. These statements have been repeated among the intimate associates of the President until they are almost common property, and for his reason additional weight is given to a dispatch also along these lines sent out from here today."

"The subject is in the minds of many prominent Republicans, and friends of the President are understood to believe that his course is bound to be a matter for frequent speculation from now on."

Local Body Now Numbers Above a Hundred.

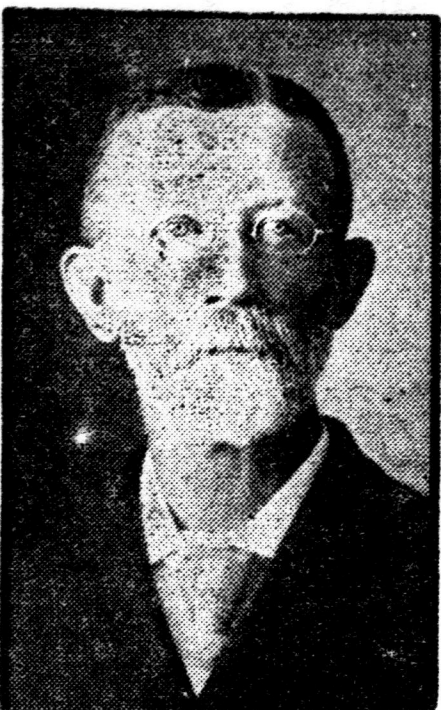
A rally of the Boy Scouts will be held on Saturday afternoon next in Queen's Park, and all boys interested in the work, whether members of the corps or not are requested to attend.

**VAN CLEVE SAYS
TO HOLD GRAYDON**

New City Official Advises That
Old Official Be Kept For
Six Months at Least.

Consulting Engineer Graydon will not be asked to hand in his resignation for a time at least if Head Engineer Van Cleve has his way.

At a meeting of the board of works held this morning a letter was read from Mr. Van Cleve, in which he accepted the position. Incidentally, he suggested that Mr. Graydon be kept in the city's service for six months' time at least.

"I would also take the liberty," he says, "of suggesting at this time, that the services of the past engineer, Mr. Graydon, be retained for a period of six months. I make this suggestion, firstly, because it would appear to be a fitting recognition of the long services which Mr. Graydon has rendered to the city of London, and secondly, for the reason that I will thus have an opportunity to become familiar in all respects with the work heretofore under Mr. Graydon's direction, it being possible that all the information in regard to the several works may not be a matter of complete record. I will advise you as soon as possible as to the date at which I can undertake the duties of my office, and think that such time will not be long delayed."

The committee filed the letter, but it is understood that the movement on foot to get rid of Mr. Graydon will not be carried out at this time. Nothing will be done now in any event until Mr. Van Cleve is on the ground.

MISSIONARY IN INDIA

Rev. D. A. Gunn to Go Out Under the
Auspices of Baptists.

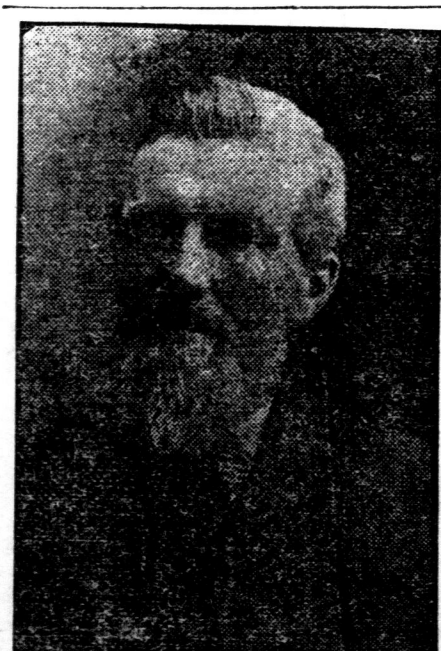
Toronto, Sept. 15.—Rev. D. A. Gunn, of Calgary, has been recommended for Baptist missionary work in India, and he may go early in November. At one time Mr. Gunn was secretary of the Y. M. C. A. at the Soo, and at present is provincial secretary of the Sunday School Teachers' Training Association for Alberta.

A conference between a committee of pastors on the Dominion Board of Baptists Foreign Mission and a committee from the American Evangelical, Lutheran Missionary Board of Philadelphia take place in Toronto early in October, when matters of common interest in India will be discussed.

WORKING TOGETHER.

Toronto, Sept. 15.—"The way the Protestants and Roman Catholics are working together in the temperance cause in Quebec, is certainly hopeful," said Rev. J. W. Atkins, field secretary of temperance and moral reform for the Methodist Church, yesterday.

Mr. Atkins, who has just returned from touring the eastern provinces, told of a successful temperance congress at Knowlton, Que. He also spoke of Archbishop Bruchesi's firm stand as another sign of progress.

BERLIN ASKS FOR POWER CELEBRATION

Mr. Beck Promises to Take the
Matter into His Consideration.

Mayor Hahn, Mr. Laekner, M. P. P. Aid. K. Laing, and Ald. Jansen, of Berlin, are in the city today, to interview Hon. Adam Beck regarding the official opening of the Niagara power lines.

The Minister of Power met them at the station, and with Mr. Philip Pocock, he took the visitors about the city. They were the first shown the London waterworks system, and the artesian well plant was shown them.

Later they were taken to the London Club for lunch. They were then taken to the Byron sanatorium, and shown through the grounds.

Thomas Kipp, of Ottawa, Is Charged With Bare-Faced Robbery
On the Exhibition Grounds—Sent for Trial
On One Charge.

Thomas Kipp, a dapper-looking little chap, who hails from Ottawa, got himself into a peck of trouble at the fair grounds last night through working a cash extracting process that appears to have been extremely profitable.

Kipp appeared on the grounds with a very large suitcase, and in a short time was doing the old-time stunt of giving away collar buttons, lead pencils, fountain pens, and sundry other articles.

Every now and then Mr. Kipp would hand back the purchase money, and make the purchaser a present of a whole outfit whatever it might happen to be.

Naturally, he drew a big crowd, and among them was Eldon Gould, a youth residing at 217 Hamilton road.

Burnt a Hole in Pocket.

Young Gould had a five-dollar bill that was fairly burning a hole in his pocket, and when Kipp produced razors and offered to sell them at \$1, Gould was among those who handed up his "v." He received a razor and a ticket bearing the legend: "From T to K."

Kipp told Gould to stay around awhile and he would get his change.

Gould stayed around, but when some of the crowd began to yell "Stung," he began to feel uncomfortable. He went and requested his change immediately from Kipp, and Kipp told Gould that he had a wife and 17 children in the poorhouse, and packed up his bill, and crumpling a big wad of bills into his pocket, walked away.

120,000 PEOPLE SAW THE FAIR LACK OF MIDWAY DISCUSSED MATTER TO BE THRESHED OUT

Board of Directors of the Exhibition Alluded to the Omission at a
Meeting Today But Nothing Will Be Done Until

There was quite a discussion, however, concerning the Midway. It is no secret that the Midway this year was a failure. Who is to blame is quite a different problem, but it is quite certain that there will be a decided change next year.

This year's board can do but little, as their term of office is all but expired. But they will send some recommendations to next year's board.

It is likely that something of a more tangible nature will be submitted.

FREIGHT KILLS SECTIONMEN PERIL HIDDEN BY A FOG

**PREMIER BOTHA IS DEFEATED
BUT PARTY WINS ELECTIONS**

Cape Town, South Africa, Sept. 15.—General Botha's Nationalist party tonight has 62 seats of a total of 121 in the first Parliament of United South Africa. In all 103 seats have been heard from, with the following standing:

Nationalists 62
Unionists 34

Independents 6
Laborites 1

Of these 37 were decided without a vote, 29 Nationalists and 8 Unionists being elected by acclamation.

The polling was notable for the defeat of Premier General Botha in East Pretoria. Dr. Jameson, formerly prime minister of the Cape Colony, was elected to represent Cape Town.

FIRE BALLOON FROM THE FAIR ALMOST SET FIRE TO BARN

A balloon from the Western Fair almost caused a conflagration on the premises of Mr. Chas. Baker, of the first concession of Westminster last evening.

The balloon settled over the farm, and finally alighted within a few feet of the straw stack on Mr. Baker's farm near the barns.

SWEPT OVERBOARD.

Algiers, Sept. 15.—Second Officer Funnell, of the British steamer Swazi, was drowned and lost during a fierce gale on Sept. 4. The Swazi, in command of Captain Abbey, sailed from New York on Aug. 31, for Marseilles and other ports.

R. is bringing out to Canada early in 1911. The recent rains stopped in time to save threshing operations, and the crops in Southern Alberta are looking remarkably well. In the Wetaskiwin district, threshing operations are under way, and show excellent results.

**NARROWLY ESCAPED
DROWNING IN BEER**

Vat Bursts Letting Loose 18,000
Gallons.

Fort Wayne, Ind., Sept. 15.—A vat at a brewery here collapsed yesterday while workmen were repairing its foundation. The vat contained 18,000 gallons of beer, which poured through the cracks. The workmen were caught in the rush and were rescued with difficulty from drowning. The beer found an outlet in the sewer, which showed a head of over three feet when it discharged the "suds" into the Maumee River.

Ottawa, Sept. 15.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier left this morning for Montreal, where he will stay until the 19th, after which he will leave for Quebec on Monday. He will return to Ottawa next week. Sir Charles Fitzpatrick returned to Ottawa this morning after a summer in Europe on the Hague commission.

THE RIGHT OF WAY.

Toronto, Sept. 15.—The Dominion railway commission having decided that the Grand Trunk had the right of way over the route by which the city's power line was to come into the city, it is now necessary for the city to use the lake shore and run the power line along the exhibition front.

OBJECT TO UNIFORMS.

Windsor, Sept. 15.—Friends of Detectives Campane and Mahoney, suspended from the provincial police force for refusing to wear the uniforms adopted this year, are circulating petitions in Windsor asking Hon. J. O. Resume, representative for the riding to busy himself in their behalf. A large number of signatures have already been affixed to the petitions.

**SAVED HONEYMOONERS,
GOT \$5,000 REWARD**

Capt. Turnavick Saved Lives of Bartlett Coult and His Bride.

Montreal, Sept. 16.—The arrival here this morning of Capt. E. Turnavick, owner of a fishing fleet operating on the Labrador coast, and commander of one of his own vessels, brings to light a remarkable tale of romance. Capt. Turnavick reached the city in time to receive a check for a thousand pounds, which arrived for him in the English mail this morning. It was from Mr. Bartlett Coult, of London, as a reward for saving his life and that of his bride. The Bartlett couple started from the Shetland Islands, where he has an estate, in his private yacht on their wedding tour last July. The yacht was blown out across the Atlantic in a big storm in which the three members of the crew were drowned. Captain Turnavick, in his fishing schooner, came across the couple clinging to each other in the steering of the sinking yacht off the Labrador coast, near Cape Muskivik, and rescued them. He sent them back to England on another fishing vessel. This morning he received his reward.

**ALLEGED THIEF
SENT FOR TRIAL**

Lad of Fifteen Accused of Stealing a Bicycle.

A lad of fifteen who was arrested a week ago, charged with the theft of a bicycle from a Talbot street bicycle store, appeared before Squire Chittick at the court house this morning, and was committed for trial.

Four witnesses were heard, the partners of the firm, D. Lipsitt, a Mount Bridges blacksmith, who is alleged to have purchased the wheel from the boy, and High Constable Hughes, who recovered the bicycle and made the arrest.

The boy was defended by Mr. W. G. R. Bartram, and will probably come up before a judge tomorrow.

**PROBABLE LIVED FOR SEVERAL
HOURS AFTER IT HAD
BEEN GIVEN.**

**LARGE DOSE
ADMINISTERED**

Another Big and Fashionable
Audience at Resumption of
Crippen Case.

[Associated Press Cable.]
London, Sept. 16.—Dr. William Henry Wilcox, scientific analyst to the home office, who discovered a deadly drug in the body found in the home of Dr. Hawley H. Crippen, took the stand when the trial of the doctor and his typist, Ethel Clare Leneve, for the murder of the former's wife, was continued today, and swore that death was due to poison.

The physician described the nature of the medicine used, and said that from a quarter to half a grain would prove fatal. He had found two-sevenths of a grain after a lapse of from four to eight months, and judged that more than half a grain had been administered. He found no other cause of death, and expressed the opinion that the victim survived the dose an hour or more.

Before Dr. Wilcox was called the crown introduced medical testimony to the last session did not deter the curious from struggling to get into the Bow street police court today, and the section apportioned to the public was again crowded. The spectators included the usual array of fashionably dressed women and these thoughtfully removed their hats that those seated behind them might not be obstructed in their view.
