PREMIER SOUNDS A WARNING NOTE

Declares Victory for Bourassa Means Disruption for Canada.

DENOUNCE THE ALLIANCE

Slashing Attack of Sir Wilfrid on the Borden-Bourassa Pact.

Quebec, Sept. 14.—"If the unholy alliance of Borden and Bourassa were to prevail, you would have Canada split by such and religious dissension and the great work of confederation would be undone."
With these words of warning ringing forth, Sir Wilfrid Laurier tonight gave what was undoubtedly the greatest and most powerful address of the present campaign. The Premier was at his best. A huge crowd of six thousand greeted the immense drill hall and cheered again and again. Sir Wilfrid spoke first in English and in an able address covered the various issues before the electors. All were dealt with in masterly style, the fallacies of the Conservative economies being punctured and their hollow opposition to reciprocity ridiculed by his arguments.

A Splendid Effort.
It was, however, when he took up the alliance of the Conservatives with the Nationalists that he rose to a great height of oratory. Sir Wilfrid did not excel tonight's address. In a clear, ringing voice, and the luscious silences of an eager crowd, he exposed the hollow and sham of the unholy alliance between the Nationalists and Conservatives. He appealed to you to put down the unholy and monstrous alliance which has been formed between the French Nationalists and the English Tories. They have nothing in common but their hatred of me. They hate their respective principles worse than poison. If this unholy alliance prevails either Bourassa or Borden will be destroyed. They are the lion and the lamb, and one will eat the other. But, worse than that, it will mean the disruption of Canada. They are setting against race creed against creed, and you cannot build a nation on these principles. This is my answer to them all. I have given it freely. I am a Canadian first, last and all the time." (Wild cheers.)

"I am a British subject, proud of our connection with our Mother Land, and loyal to the flag which shelters us. I have a double duty to perform, a duty to my country and a duty to Canada. There is not a man living who can say that I have failed to do my double duty. This adherence to our duties to Canada and the Empire has won four elections and will win again."

"What," asked Sir Wilfrid, "do the Conservatives and their allies discuss? Is it principle? No. They appeal to passions and to prejudices. They set race against race and creed against creed. If I have done anything in my fifteen years it has been to build up a united Canada, a land in which all races and all creeds could live in peace and harmony. This they would destroy." Sir Wilfrid's review of the work he had accomplished, his plea for unity of the English and French, his denunciation of the Nationalist and Conservative alliance, his appeal to the people of Canada to set their faces against all practices that threaten the foundations of truth and righteousness during the coming election and to go to the polls with a full and sensible understanding of their responsibility. APPEAL FROM BISHOPS FOR CLEAN ELECTION

Plea Is Made to All Canadians to Guard the Country's Honor.

The closing session of the general synod yesterday afternoon was marked by an appeal of the house of bishops to the people of Canada to set their faces against all practices that threaten the foundations of truth and righteousness during the coming election and to go to the polls with a full and sensible understanding of their responsibility. Shortly after the appeal was brought in, the synod was brought to a close with silent prayer, and the benediction pronounced by Archbishop Matheson, primate of Canada.

The Manifesto.

The appeal was as follows: The view of the near approach of election day, the bishops of the Church of England in Canada hereby appeal to the Christian public throughout the Dominion to promote, at this time, by every means at its command, a high standard of political morality and a great sensitiveness of conscience respecting the exercise of a voter's responsibility. If this Dominion is to attain true and lasting greatness and to achieve the position of influence which would appear to be offered it by Divine Providence, it must set its face against all practices that threaten the foundations of truth and righteousness amongst us.

"The bishops, therefore, desire at this time to remind men of all political views and parties that political purity is one of the essential foundation stones upon which national greatness and prosperity must rest, and in particular that to buy or sell a vote is to act the part of a traitor to our country, to violate a first principle of righteousness, and to invite the just contempt and condemnation of all good men."
