CONSTRUCTION COMPANY CHARGED WITH SLAVERY

U. S. Govt. Requests Canadian Authorities to Investigate G.T.P. Construction Camps.

[Canadian Press.] Winnipeg, Nov. 28.—If the request made from Washington, through United States Consul Jones here, be granted by the Ottawa authorities and a rigid inquiry be instituted into alleged conditions in the camps of the Foley, Welch and Stewart Construction Company on the Grand Trunk Pacific throughout the west, sensations are promised, that is if the complaining laborers substantiate their charges.

Conditions of virtual slavery are alleged to exist, once the men get into these camps. It is too far in the wilderness to get out readily, and those leaving are forbidden under penalty to be given food or shelter at other camps on the long tramp out. If the men quit a series of deductions are made from their pay checks for all sorts of things. Owing to such deductions it is usual for the men to get no pay until after they have worked a month or six weeks. Foreigners through their ignorance of English are the worst sufferers. The men are helpless and at the mercy of their employers, because there is no settlement nor trace of civilization for miles around, except at their camps.

Charged Big Prices.

Among other items in the complaints of the laborers are these: The long journey means their carrying light outfits, and the necessities which they procure subsequently at the company's stores are sold to them at exorbitant prices, as, for example: drivers' gloves \$3.50 a pair; boots, \$12 a pair, and cheap pants \$12 a pair. The men are charged \$7 a week for board, and the very poorest sort of food is served. The men are not allowed to work or food there. If a man leaves with consent he is paid by check which minor officials cash for him with a 10 per cent deduction. Foley, Welch and Stewart headquarters at Spokane deny there is anything wrong.

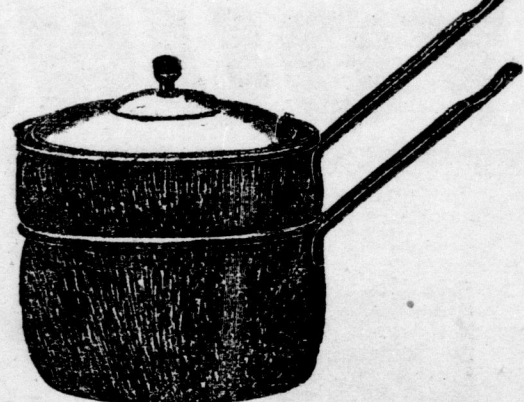

ABDUCTION CHARGE MAY FOLLOW WEDDING

Relatives of Sixteen-Year-Old St. Thomas Youth Greatly Perturbed.

St. Thomas, Nov. 28.—On the ground that 16-year-old Thomas Hornby, of this city, did not have the consent of his parents to his marriage with Eva Loucks, of Clear Creek, a woman much older, the youth's parents may bring a charge of abduction. Miss Loucks came out from England a short time ago.

On Saturday evening last, a local clergyman officiated at the marriage. At the time the minister found everything quite regular. The marriage license was produced; the bride, although she looks much older, said she was 19 on her last birthday, and the groom, although his relatives say he is only 16 years, gave his age as 21. They gave their future place of residence as 89 Malakoff street, city.

Since the wedding, however, the relatives of the young man have taken a strong stand in the matter, and the town authorities have been interviewed with a view towards securing an annulment of the ceremony. They tried for a time to induce young Hornby to give up his bride, but he refused, and later, when he appeared at his old home on Yorkmouth Heights, it is said he was looked up by his parents.

They claim that Miss Loucks is many years the senior of young Hornby, and point out that she recently married a Southwold man named Schram, who some time ago was sent to prison for six months on a charge of having two wives. Still more recently Miss Loucks took action against Schram in an effort to have him contribute towards the keep of their child, and she was successful in a small way.

MONSTER HOGS

Farmers Brought Splendid Animals to Komoka For Shipment.

A GIANT BIRD.

New York, N. Y., Nov. 29. — Parts of a giant bird, which winged its way over North America three million years ago, have just been brought to the American Museum of Natural History by Prof. Walter Granger, who has been

making fossil investigations in Wyoming. The bird, according to Prof. Granger, was the largest feathered creature that ever existed in North America. The fragments brought here consist of the bones of the feet, found in the Big Horn Basin.

JAMES M. SHANLY DEAD

Was One of the Best-Known Civic Engineers in Canada.

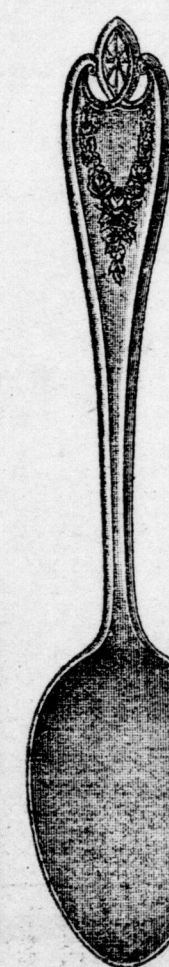
Montreal, Nov. 28.—James M. Shanly, one of the best known civil engineers in Canada, died yesterday. The deceased was born in Illinois 55 years ago, but came to Canada at an early age. He was educated at Galt Collegiate Institute and Toronto University. After graduation he started practicing in Montreal.

One of the first pieces of work done by the late Mr. Shanly was in connection with the Beauharnois Junction Railway, now a part of the New York Central's road, into Montreal. After this he was chief engineer of the railway which Judge Foster, of Knowlton, and Mr. Alphonse Charlebois, of this city, undertook to build from Vaudeville, on the main line of the C. P. R., to Ottawa, and afterwards bought by them and incorporated into that system now known as the Ottawa Short Line, although, as a matter of fact, it is a part of the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway from Montreal to the Pacific Ocean.

After 1894 Mr. Shanly was chief engineer of the Baie des Chaleurs Railway, later known as the Atlantic and Lake Superior and the Central Railway of Canada, first called the Ottawa Valley.

He was a member of the council of the Canadian Society of Civil Engineers, and was also a member of the Engineers' Club. He is survived
