

FARM LABOR LACKING

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, April 16.-Another attempt to oulder blame upon the Dominion Government for provincial negligence was witnessed in the Legislature last evening when the Government negatived Mr. Mayberry's (South Oxford) resolution for an investigation into the causes of rural epopulation.

The member for South Oxford moved alarming decrease of approximately 100,-0 in the rural population in the counties of Old Ontario, during the period of ten years, disclosed by the Dominion ensus of 1911; and in view of the genal scarcity of farm labor throughou ntario, which for some years past has he province, and has resulted in a maerial diminution in the agricultural proaction of the province; this House is he opinion that a select committee of the House, or a commission of practical men, should be appointed to inquire into the whole situation and report as to what means can be taken to remedy or improve existing conditions."

A Serious Problem. The problem of securing sufficient farm abor was most serious, said Mr. Mayperry. He agreed with the statement of the late Deputy Minister of Agriculture that the farm production of Ontario ould be increased 100 per cent if proper nethods were employed. It was one hing to give such advice and another hing to earry it out under existing conitions. Farming was the most under-named industry in the province today. Although farm products never brought uch a high price, never were so many arms for sale. The adoption of elecricity and labor-saving machinery had roduced little or no results to solve the roblem. Dairymen were not increasing inobtainable.
