

Jewish Festivals.

Dear Miss Grey,-Will you kindly insert in your columns a list of the Jewish fasts and festivals and date of occurrence and oblige a constant reader, M.E.B., Coldstream.

Ans .- The principal feasts and fasts are: The festival of the Passover which occurs in the first month of the Jewish ecclesiastical year, a time corresponding much to portions of March and April of the Christian year. This feast is also known as the feast of unleavened bread, being a period of eight days when nothing containing leaven enters the house of the Jew.

A second feast of importance is that

of Pentecost, occurring on the sixth and seventh days of Sivan, which corresponds to parts of May and June. Tammuz occurs. No food is taken from sunrise till sunset in commem-oration of the calamities which befel the Jews on this date. Nebuchadnezzar conquered the city of Jerusalem on this date, and many years later, the Emperor Titus at the head of a Roman

army devastated the city and took many captives. A second fast is held on the 9th day of Av, the fifth month, in recognition of the completion of The seventh month (Tishrl) of the Jewish ecclesiastical year is the first month of their civil year, and known

to us as part of September and October. On the first and second day, the festival of the new year is ob-served. On the 15th day of Tishri, the feast of Tabernacles, an important festival in the Jewish year, is celebrated; this continues nine days, the last day being the day of solemn assembly of atonement occurs.

CAKES THAT ARE MOES OF MRS. NEWLYWED

Recipes That Do Not Call for Expensive "Hen-Fruit." Molasses Fruit Drops

One cupful molasse One-half cupful of shortening. One-half cupful of sour milk, One level teaspoonful of soda. One level teaspoonful of cinnamon One-half teasponful of cloves. Three cupfuls of pastry flour. One cupful of raisins chopped after

Melt the shortening, then add ingredients in the order named, sifting the soda with flour and dredge the fruit with some of the flour before adding the soda. As some flour thickens more than others more may have to be added. The batter should be thick enough to drop nicely from a spoon on to a greased pan without spreading together. Bake in a moderate quick oven.

Carrot Pudding.
One cup flour, one cup bread crumbs. one cup chopped suet, half cup brown sugar, one teaspoon of soda, sifted in flour, a pinch of salt, one cup of seeded raisins, one cup of currants, and one cup of grated carrots. Mix all together and boil three hours.

Rich Brown Cake.
One cup brown sugar, ½ cup lard
or butter, one cup molasses, one cup seeded raisins, one cup milk, five cups

sifted pastry flour and one teaspoon soda, Cream, butter and sugar, add soda to molasses; stir up well, then beat into the creamed mass. Mix raisins and flour, and add that, alternately with milk. Beat well, then bake in obiong or round loaf moulds, in slow, steady heat. This is rather a large cake, but will keep a long time. Ice with plain icing, (pulverized sugar, moistened with milk or water, can be used.) Once tried you will make it

Date Gems. Sift together two cups of flour, two teaspoons baking powder, one-half teaspoon cinnamon, one-half teaspoon ginger and a little salt. Heat one-half cup molasses and a tablespoon butter in a saucepan until the butter melts. Then stir in the dry ingredients, alternating with one-half cupful of milk until it is well blended. Now add one cupful of chopped dates which have been liberally sprinkled with flour.
