Mahoney of the Guelph Maple Leafs, had a lengthy talk with President Fitzgerald of the Canadian League, impressing upon the president the fact that the Canadian League could not get along on a salary limit of \$1,200 without every manager trying to get around the said limit. President Mahoney urged that President Fitzgerald take a mail vote of the managers, asking them if they favored raising the salary limit to \$1,400 per month, exclusive of a manager. This President Fitzgerald consented to do.

President Mahoney has heard from Louie Cook, who states that he is a fast shortstop, and is highly recommended by Jack Dunn, of the Baltimore club.

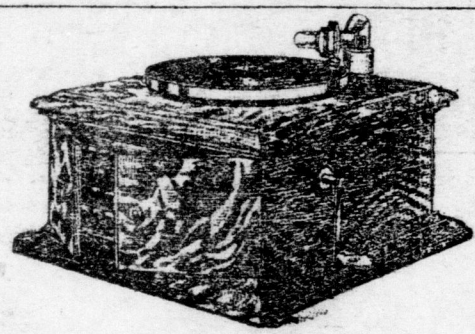

CITY LEAGUE SCHEDULE WILL SUFFER CHANGES

Different Arrangement of Playing Hours For Last Five Nights—Other Business Discussed.

The City League executive changed one of the rules of the constitution at a meeting held last evening. The new ruling permits the teams to sign men until Feb. 1. The clause stating that clubs were to give a week's notice of the signing up of a player was eliminated. After Feb. 1 all contract books must be in the hands of the secretary of the league with all stubs properly filled out.

The cup donated by The Advertiser to the league was officially accepted on motion of Mr. H. A. Marshall, seconded by Dr. Windsor. The secretary was instructed to arrange for the printing of the schedule.

The last five nights of the schedule will be changed as regards their playing hours. Some mix-up in the hours has occurred, one of the teams having too many late-hour games. This will be remedied, and the new arrangement published shortly.

ENGLISH RUGBY CIRCLES STIRRED BY SENSATION

Oxford University Players May Be Professionalized.

New York, Jan. 22.—A cable from London says:

A sensation in English amateur rugby football circles was caused today, when it became known that, following the wholesale suspensions of certain clubs and players by the Rugby Union, which controls the game, on charges of professionalism, an official of the union is investigating similar charges against Oxford University players.

These players are alleged to have taken part in a French tour at Christmas "without authorization of the governing body, for which they received expenses."

SKATING CHAMPIONSHIPS BEGIN.

Cleveland, Jan. 22.—The international indoor amateur skating championship races begin here tonight, with skaters from a dozen clubs in Canada and the United States entered. Three events are on the program for tonight—the one-sixth mile (two laps), the one-half mile and the one mile. Several minor events will fill in, and President Allan L. Blanchard, of the Western Skating Association, will give an exhibition. Blanchard also will referee tonight's events. Robert MacLean, of Chicago, is expected to retain his title of amateur champion.

WANDERERS ARE HOT-FOOT

Davidson, Cameron, Wilson and McLean, of the Torontos. The good showing of these boys has created quite a stir in the eastern hockey centres, and they now realize that all good hockey players do not reside in Ottawa or Montreal. ST. THOMAS AFTER ORT AS MANAGER

Sensational Kazoo Shortstop, However, Believes He Will Go to Spokane Instead.

Kalamazoo, Mich., Jan. 21.—George Ort, who did sensational work at short for the local South Michigan League club last season, will probably not be seen in a Kazoo uniform this year. "George" is undecided right now with whom he'll sign up. He has been offered the managership of the St. Thomas club in the Canadian League, while Joe Cohn, manager of the Spokane club in the Northwest Circuit, is also after him. It looks very much at present as though Ort would send in his signed contract to the Spokane club, the terms offered being better. In 1911 Ort played with Los Angeles in the Pacific Coast League.

O'ROURKE SUES "BOXING."

New York, Jan. 22.—A London cable says: Sporting circles here are agitated over the forthcoming libel suit by Tom O'Rourke, the boxing contest promoter and manager, of New York, against the proprietors of "Boxing," a London sporting paper. The courts today fixed Feb. 11 for the hearing of the case.

The paper charges O'Rourke with discreditable practices in connection with various big boxing contests promoted or managed by him in the United States, mentioning what it calls specific instances.

O'Rourke is, of course, claiming heavy damages.

TWO MEETS ANNUALLY ON NEW MILE TRACK

Harness Horse Races Will Be Feature of London's New Track — Work Begins Shortly.

Work will be commenced shortly on a mile race track on land recently purchased by Mr. J. L. Counsell, of Hamilton, about 1 1/2 miles east of the city, on Dundas street.

One hundred and thirty-five acres have been secured, and on it will be erected a most modern racing plant, similar in type to that at the Woodbine, Toronto.

Plans have been prepared, and will be sent to London for architects to look over at a very early date.

Local capital is interested in the scheme, and in addition it will be backed by some of the most prominent horsemen in the province.

The deeds for the property have been signed, and the work is made. As soon as the spring opens construction work will begin.

The chair for the meet is held by Messrs. Counsell and Bruce, of Hamilton, and was issued by the Dominion Government at the last session of Parliament.

Under the present scheme two race meets will be held annually, one in the spring and the other in the autumn. These meetings will be under the control of the Ontario Jockey Club.

In addition, there will be harness horse races. A circuit for Canadian horses similar to the Grand Circuit in the United States is being organized, over mile tracks in Montreal, Toronto, Windsor, Port Erie and London. These will be earlier than the meetings held on the Grand Circuit in the United States.

Mr. J. L. Counsell informed The Advertiser that it is expected that work would be commenced as early in the spring as possible.

"We want to be ready for the fall meeting," declared Mr. Counsell, "I think we will start as soon as the frost is out of the ground, and run the work a complete season. We will be in the same circuit as the Woodbine, Blue Bonnets, Hamilton, Port Erie and Windsor."

It was hinted also that local capital would be sought in large quantities to finance the scheme.

It is estimated that \$150,000 will be expended in making the plant one of the finest in the country.

OWEN SOUND OPENS ITS NEW HOCKEY RINK

Home Team Celebrates With a Win Over Wiarton.

Owen Sound, Jan. 21.—The first game of hockey to be played in the new Riverside Rink took place tonight between Owen Sound and Wiarton, and proved to be the fastest and most exciting seen here in years. Owen Sound won by a 5 to 3 tally, and a score being 4 to 2, at half-time the score was 5 to 2 in favor of Wiarton. In the second half, largely owing to the work of Falkingham and Lange, the Owen Sounders tied up the count, and at two minutes to full time notched the decisive tally. For Wiarton,
