NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., July 7.—The second day of the O. B. A. tourney saw the trophy down to the semi-finals. The draw for 9 a.m. Wednesday being Burns (Niagara-on-the-Lake) vs. Eaw (Fergus) and Begg (Canada) vs. Peary (Victoria). The third round of the association is finished and the second round of the consolation.

The annual meeting of the O. B. A. took place tonight at the Clifton House. Following officers elected—President, Sir John Willison; hon. president, W. C. Chisholm, K.C.; Montreal, president, Dr. Geo. C. Creelman, Guelph; first vice-president, C. McD. Hay, R.C.Y.C.; second vice-president, W. D. Euler, Berlin; hon. secretary-treasurer, Geo. M. 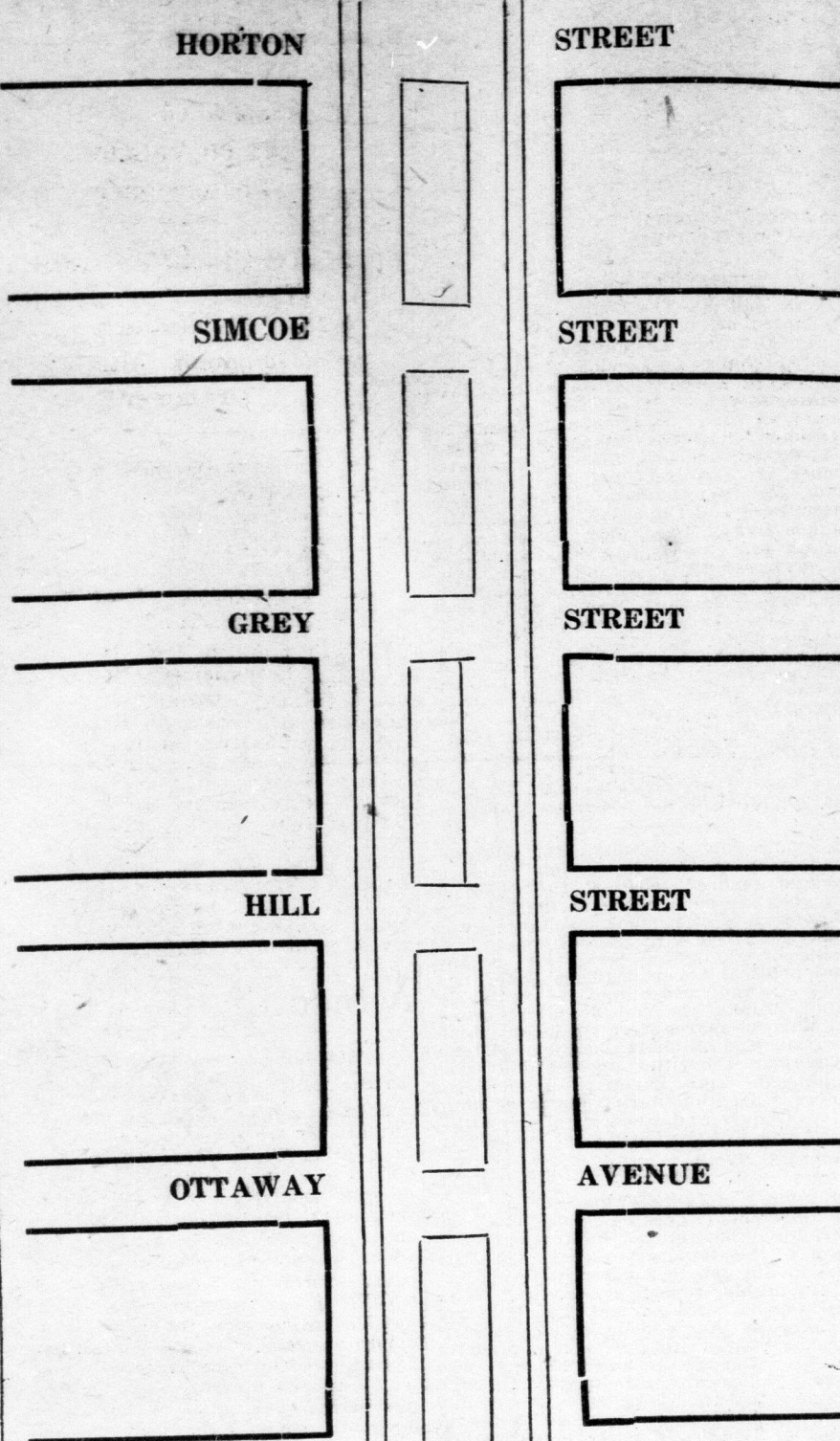

HUSBAND ILL, BUT MOTHER REFUSES TO ACCEPT CHARITY

Has Been Placed in False Light by Solicitation of Kind Neighbors.

Mrs. Ernest Caton, of 13 Childers street, declared today that the kindness and solicitation of neighbors had served to put her in a false light with regard to the family condition and she resents the assertion that her children are neglected.

The family came here about a year ago from the old country, the husband being in the best of health as are his wife and all his children. A few weeks ago, however, he was taken ill and his case has been pronounced incurable and he is now in the Alexandra Sanatorium.

As he did not bring the disease with him, but evidently contracted it here, the authorities are at a loss on how to apply the three-year deportation clause.

Praised by Inspector. The Children's Aid Society, who is familiar with the Caton case, said today that Mrs. Caton deserved great praise for her heroic efforts in providing for the family while her husband is ill. "They are all healthy and may be worth thousands of dollars to London in the future," said Mr. Sanders.

It was said today that deportation of the family would not be considered as there was an excellent chance for Mr. Caton to recover.

Distressed by Publicity. "We do not need assistance," said Mrs. Caton today, "although I am greatly obliged for the kindness of neighbors in seeking to bring me relief. I did not know that we were threatened with deportation at any time as I am able and willing to work and provide for the family. It has distressed me considerably to be brought into this publicity because my husband has been unfortunate enough to be taken ill."

PICNIC CROWDS FLOCK TO SUMMER RESORT

Sunday School Picnics Galore at Port Stanley and Springbank Park.

Record crowds were at Springbank park today. During the morning and the early afternoon, 22 special cars ran Sunday School picnics to the park. Besides these, thousands of persons took advantage of the Wednesday afternoon half holiday. It is estimated that there were more than 4,000 people at Springbank.

Port Stanley too had its quota of visitors. Eight London churches picnicked there today. The following churches sent several hundred to port on their annual outings. All Saints, Anglican, Hill street Methodist; Askin Street Methodist; St. James, Anglican; Talbot Street Baptist; St. Paul's Catholic; and the Salvation Army.

hour this morning in putting their charges through the different movements of the march.

First of all, they marched past in column, and were told "See that the space between the ranks is equal to the length of the rank, so that you can form into line easily."

Ten paces before passing the inspecting officer the boys were told that on the order "Eyes right" from the company commanders, they must all turn their heads and bodies in the direction of the inspecting officer, and remain like that until twenty paces farther on, when they received the command "Eyes front."

Made Movement Perfect. The company leaders, of course, saluted when passing the inspection point, with their swords, if they were carrying them, or with the left hand otherwise, and at first the youngsters nervously followed suit, bringing their left hands to their foreheads and forgetting all about looking to the right. They soon picked it up, however, and before long were doing it to the entire satisfaction of their instructors.

Then came the return march, this time in quarter-column formation. This time it was "Eyes front" for everybody, and the company leaders, at the word of command given by the battalion commander, as the first rank reached the inspecting point. The position must be held by each man until the word "pass" was given, and over again they did it until one wondered how youngsters could stand the strain. Some of them, the smaller ones, did find the heavy service rifles too heavy for them, and for the time being were allowed to drill without arms. Colonel Hodgins later will endeavor to have them provided with 22 rifles.

Drilling the Buglers. Over by the C. P. R. tracks, the massed bugle bands marched, wheeled, right-about-turned and played their bugles and beat their drums, until boys and instructors bathed in perspiration.

A little further over a signal instructor was teaching boys "flag-wagging." He had a station rigged up, of which were received and written down correctly by each one of the little groups to whom the signals were being sent.

Some of the older members of the sign-making corps are beyond the point where they need instruction. These were practicing at different parts of the field, and during the day the sign-making corps were read between a group of boys a t Springbank and another group on the roof of the barracks. It is hoped this afternoon to establish a helio station at Paushan, and for the time being the sign-making corps will be used for the purpose.

This afternoon will see two shooting contests decided instead of one as previously arranged.

The cadet bands will play for the first and afterwards teams of five each from several of the companies present will take part in the skirmishing and firing contest, in which a team starts walking towards a point and the other team starts firing at it. Five rounds will be shot by each team in this contest.
