Authors Lose Big Revenues They Formerly Received From United States.

CUSTODIAN HOLDS FEES

Leo Fall and Franz Lehar Are Trying To Get Possession of Funds.

VIENNA, April 21.-Austria is an export country for dramatic literature, chiefly comic plays and musical comedies and for music in general. Before the war, the success of certain types of plays of Viennese origin, especially operettas, depended entirely on the reception in the United States and England. Royalties of many thousands of dollars used to flow regularly to Vienna from overseas. When the United States entered the war this was stopped and all royalties were treated as property of alien enemies and put under the supervision of the public trustee. Since the conclusion of peace several well known Austrian authors-among them Leo Fall and Franz Lehar-have repeatedly money, which increased in value from on just what American producers are day to day with the rising exchange rate of the dollar. Hitherto all these efforts to make the French film mart known appear to have failed.

It has been reported here that America intends to release the sequestered property of private persons of formerly hostile countries. 
