Only Foreign Goods.

It will be observed that the scheme is to be applied to goods imported from foreign countries only, viz., outside the British Empire.

As is well known, many consular officers of other countries are established in Canada. For years they have been collecting fees on invoices covering exports from Canada to the various foreign countries. In some cases no fee is charged, in others a rather heavy fee is imposed. Some have adopted a flat rate, others charge a fee on an ad valorem basis. The fees which have thus been collected in Canada in the aggregate amount to a very large sum.


