BRITAIN FIRM; WILL NOT LIE DOWN TO TURK

Orders Commissioners At
Constantinople To Oppose
Breaking of Treaty.

USE FORCE IF NEED BE

French Summon Foch to Pre-
pare Plans To Stop
Kemal.

BULLETIN.
London, Nov. 7.—Lord Derby, minister of war in the Bonar Law cabinet, was summoned hurriedly to London today in connection with the Near Eastern crisis. The interruption of Lord Derby's speaking tour was considered a sign that the cabinet views as extremely grave the menace at Constantinople.

Special Cable to The Advertiser.
London, England, Nov. 7.—The allied governments today instructed their high commissioners in Constantinople to oppose the Turkish threats to violate the Mudania agreement. "With force if necessary." The foreign office, let it be known, that Britain will not in any way capitulate to Mustafa Kemal's demands. It is believed possible that Kemal is merely bluffing.

Marshal Foch, allied war-time commander-in-chief, was summoned by Premier Poincaré today to consider military plans to be invoked should the Turks violate the Mudania agreement, says a special dispatch from Paris.

A French cabinet meeting was also held today to consider the situation, again brought to a crisis by seizure of Constantinople by Turkish Nationalist civil authorities. Foch, considering the necessity of possible military action, is understood to have maintained to Poincaré that it would be comparatively easy for the Allies to stop Kemal's men should they attempt to cross toward Thrace as threatened.

Official France, as well as the press, executed an about face from its position of sympathy with Turk Nationalist manoeuvres today. From all quarters was voiced a demand that the Moslems not be allowed to violate the Mudania agreement or endanger the international regime over the neutral zone.

PANIC IN CONSTANTINOPLE.
Constantinople, Nov. 7.—Panic reigned in foreign quarters of the city today as Turkish Nationalist military forces advanced close to the barbed-wire barricades of British forces at Chank. The Kemalists served notice that the British would not be allowed to advance beyond the mile near the city limits. General Harrington, British commander, promptly entered a sharp protest to Ismet Pasha, Turkish commander, following this manoeuvre.

Disorders accompanied the panic in Constantinople coincident with the city's seizure by Kemalists, and the menacing attitude of the Moslem militia. Four British soldiers were stabbed in street fighting.

Greeks fled toward Salonika, fearing unprecedented massacres.

EXPECT KEMAL TO BACK DOWN.

Constantinople, Nov. 7.—(Canadian Press).—There is reason to believe that the Kemalists will climb down off their high horses. The Allies have now taken a strong, united attitude toward the demands of the Ankara government that the allied troops evacuate Constantinople, and that they enter the city by the Turkish ports, and then only with the consent of the Ankara authorities. The demands of the Ankara government, which the allied commissioners have refused to grant, and the new crisis which has arisen from the situation, is the subject of a conference yesterday between the allied generals and Rafet Pasha, the new civil governor of Constantinople, the Reuters correspondent in Constantinople.

The tone of this meeting was sharp and positive, in strong contrast to the previous meetings, which were characterized by friendly and mutual consideration. The allied generals informed Rafet Pasha in clear terms that they intend to retain military authority in Constantinople until it is decided to formally turn the area over to the Turks. Rafet then said he was anxious to agree with them, but that he would not accept outside control in any form. He added that he would have to refer to the Ankara government for further instructions, and would again consult with the allied representatives today.

Three additional classes of Turkish soldiers have been called to the colors.

**BREAD DEAR IN FRANCE AS
DOORS CLOSED TO WHEAT**

Shortage of Home Crop Makes Flour
Shortage While Exchange Stops
Imports.

Paris, Nov. 7.—(Canadian Press Cable).—The deficiency in this year's wheat crop doubtless will entail an advance in the price of bread in France. The price at present is 1 franc 5 centimes per 2.2 pounds, and is fixed by the government.

The minister of agriculture has addressed a letter to the prefect's department, stating that the present situation is due to causes which are not likely to recur. With the rates of exchange as they stand at present, he says, it is imperative to avoid the importation of wheat into this country. The minister appeals to the population to avoid the necessity of sending French gold abroad.



MAYORALTY RACE NARROWS DOWN TO THREE.

**EARL DUNBLANE
MOURNS FATE**

Held For Grand Larceny,
Maintains Aristocracy
of Birth.

Charlevoix, Mich., Nov. 7.—A. J. Walker Greig, the self-styled Earl of Dunblane, incarcerated here during the adjournment of his trial on four charges of larceny by embezzlement, and who, hitherto, refused to interview the press regarding his business and domestic life, received the Advertiser's representative today.

For two hours we sat locked behind the two-inch bars of his cell, and for two hours the prisoner mourned his martial relations, sketched the defence of his case and proclaimed himself the victim of other men's deceptions. He was arrested on four specific charges, laid by Mrs. Mary Miller of Charlevoix, Robert Sloan of Charlevoix, Thomas of East Jordan, and C. H. Whittington of East Jordan. Each of these states he embezzled from the extent of \$500 on transaction of stock in the Title Guarantee and Casualty Company. It was during his trial that it was discovered that "Earl of Dunblane" is a millionaire's home at Cheboygan, his first wife, Christina Greig, was a resident of Toronto.

Greig is tall, being six feet, and is built in proportion. He is clean shaven with clear cut features, a broad intellectual brow rimmed with waves of the sandy hair. His eyes are blue, cold and calculating. His dress is unpretentious English. He reads the news with a black ribboned pipe, and when he talks he takes it between slim fingers to emphasize his remarks.

He maintains he is an aristocrat by birth if not by training. At a wave of his hand the jail becomes his mansion. His cell a luxurious apartment. He sits in the chair of the bars an obsequious attendant.

It is said by financial men that he was born to the purple and was a gentleman who had a smile for everyone, and that he inspired confidence. He seems unchanged. At reference to his trial he smiled with belief in the validity of his case. But a subsequent bribery charge or other serious offences were suggested his face grew pale and serious.

His first few days in jail were marked with spells of melancholy, but today his gloom was supplanted by a burst of song from the prisoner's lips. Later he wrote a letter to "Sara Countess," who returned to the Turn to Page 13, Column 7.

**CURTIN SENT DOWN
FOR 2-YEAR TERM**

Man Who Was Terrifying
W. Zorra Not Given Chance

CLAIMS LOOK AT BRITISH CABINET REVIVED BEATEN TURK

**Claims Look At British
Cabinet Revived
Beaten Turk**

NEWCASTLE, England, Nov. 7.—By the Associated Press.—Lloyd George made some sharp reference to the crisis which has arisen in the Near East since his fall from the premiership, in the political address which he delivered before a large assembly here today.

"The Near East is beginning to show symptoms of inflammation," he said. "Whatever happens, our flag must not be let down."

Later on in his speech the little Welshman said: "We had got rid of the Turks, but he has looked at the list of new ministers, and come to the conclusion that this is the time for another try."

"If the government stands by the flag, my friends, I will be wholeheartedly behind them," Mr. Lloyd George said. "I cannot treat the government to show the world that we will not be trifled with."

**FIST FIGHTS ORDER
ON THANKSGIVING**

Court Has Busy Time Smoothing Out Results of Holiday.

Evidently a consignment of liquor of which the main ingredients are boxing gloves and dynamite, has reached the city. Several hand-to-hand combats which were staged over the week-end were decided in police court today.

Pat Reilly and Fred Hopkins were "mixing it" down at the Morkin House Thanksgiving Day, and admitted they were "all right." Reilly claimed he was only defending himself, stating he was roomed at the Morkin House. The participants were fined \$10 and costs each.

One inebriate chose a local cafe to demonstrate his pugilistic ability, choosing one of the waiters for his sparring partner, much to the annoyance of the waiter. Such service did the customer display that the waiter thought he needed a few policemen to shift the balance of power, and acted accordingly. His catch-n-throw assault was fined \$10 and costs this morning.

James Hotchkiss, who follows the fair fight, was brought into court on a vagrancy charge, was given his liberty when he promised to display more diligence in his search for work. When neighbors told a north-end woman they had enough evidence on her to send her down, and persisted in repeating: "And down you go," clapping their hands in derisive glee as they taunted her, she laid a charge of using abusive language against them. Magistrate Graydon declined to register a conviction, stating that he could not find any information. If he did, anyone and everyone who had a slight disagreement with another could lay an information.

One of the witnesses in the case, although he had counsel, insisted on jumping up like a Jack-in-the-box from his seat in the spectators' section and asking for a hearing.

"If you can't keep quiet, I'll have you put out," the court warned. "If you act that way here, you must act the same at home."

Housebreakers were busy in North London over the week-end, although little of value was purchased, according to the reports Tuesday morning.

An entrance was effected at the Orange Hall, Adelaide street, Saturday night, when a portion of the foundation was actually removed by the invaders. Nothing of much value is missing.

On Sunday evening thieves smashed the side door at Waterloo street, the residence of William McNair, and entered the premises. Although the bureau drawers and other likely receptacles for money or valuables were completely ransacked, nothing was taken that can be ascertained at this moment.

It is the belief that the act was the work of amateurs as such weapons as stone throwers, saws and the like were employed to pry open the drawers, while porch-climbers and first-floor workers would be armed with the regulation plumb line.

**MRS. CACCAMO SEEKS TRACE OF
MISSING HUSBAND**

The administration ship subsidy bill also will be brought up for early consideration in the special session, it was indicated.

New York, Nov. 7.—The great American jury today registered its verdict upon the work of those who have controlled the nation's political destiny the past two years, and expressed its judgment concerning the control to be exercised for the coming two years.

With the opening of the polls this morning, the "off year" congressional election was under way. The entire membership of the House of Representatives (435) was to be elected and 34 United States senators.

Thirty-three governors, many state legislatures, and a host of state, county and municipal officials were to be chosen.

Foggy weather, with occasional showers, was in order throughout the east when the first voters went to the polls.

Early reports from various parts of the country indicated the probability of a heavy vote in congressional elections. The strenuous electioneering which marked the close of the campaign in many districts would be a heavy vote in congressional elections.

Political observers who have followed the campaign closely believe that there is but little chance of today's election changing the political aspect of the House of Representatives.

It is not improbable that the Republican majority in the House may be diminished.

Democratic leaders profess to see no change.

**DENIES HUDSON ROAD
WILL BE ABANDONED**

Commission for Northern Manitoba
Replies to Many Questions
Asked.

Winnipeg, Nov. 7.—A. J. Carnahan, commissioner for northern Manitoba, has described as "misleading" the report emanating from the Pas that the picking up of unusual railway traffic on the Hudson Bay Railway indicated that completion and operation of the railway would not be brought about.

**BEGIN HUNT FOR

Police Search Province For
Missing Daughter of
South Londoners.

**TURK EDITOR IS NOW
CONDEMNED TO DEATH**

Constantinople, Nov. 7.—Ali Kemal, editor of the Constantinople anti-Nationalist newspaper Sabah, was today sentenced to death by the Turkish authorities here, the allies have been informed. Late last night the allied representatives gave Sabah Pasha, the new civil governor of the city, twenty-four hours in which to release the editor.

**DANFORD LAKE MAN SHOT
BY LEANING ON OWN GUN**

Ottawa, Nov. 7.—Daniel Cote of Danford Lake was brought to a local hospital yesterday suffering from a gunshot wound, which he received on Saturday while hunting. He was using an old rifle, the stock of which was cracked. Booming fatigued, he leaned on the rifle, with the barrel pointing upward. His weight caused the cracked part of the stock to bend against the trigger and discharge the cartridge. The bullet entered his chest, coming out through his shoulder.

Hope is held for his recovery.

FINDS CHARGES MADE WITHOUT ANY FOUNDATION

Minister Makes Thorough In-
vestigation of Conditions at
Local Institution.

VISITS MANY PATIENTS

Compliments Staff On Efficient Manner Administration Is Carried Out.

After a thorough investigation of the administration of the Westminster Psychopathic Hospital, occupying the greater part of Tuesday morning, Hon. Dr. H. S. Beland, minister of soldiers' civil re-establishment, attributed the charges of mistreatment at the hospital, which were laid by the Wallaceburg officials of the G. W. V. A. to hallucinations, not to be unexpected from the mental condition of the patient who made complaint.

According to the charge, a patient at the hospital, J. C. Gorman, claimed to have been abused, and badly treated. He left the institution, without the knowledge of the authorities there, and later turned up at Wallaceburg. To the officials of the G. W. V. A. there he related his story, and at his earnest request a complaint was made to the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment.

In order to look thoroughly into the charges, which, if true, would be a disgrace to the institution, Dr. Beland decided to personally conduct the investigation.

Finds No Foundation.
"I believe Westminster Hospital to be an exceptionally well-managed institution," Dr. Beland said after his investigation. He further stated that he believed that the charges were absolutely no foundation to the charges.

The minister carefully inspected every department of the institution. Considerable time was spent in the wards, among the men, and in the vocational training and dental therapy departments. From the personal contact with the men, Dr. Beland could find no cause for complaint.

Dr. Beland congratulated the officials on the appearance and cleanliness of the hospital methods, and the administration. The minister remained to luncheon as guest of the hospital staff.

Before going to the hospital Dr. Beland was of the opinion that there might be some truth in the charge laid, but that in an institution of the nature of Westminster Hospital, where so many patients were being taken care of, and especially in view of the fact that there were so many different forms, and degrees of intensity of mental disease, some trivial matter was very often magnified in the patient's troubled mind.

Evidence Contradictory.
"I have investigated similar cases several times," Dr. Beland said. "I have made it a point to talk to the same patient twice within the course of a few minutes, and ask the same question in different forms, and the patient has given contradictory answers. That was to be expected, because of the distracted and confused nervous condition, and the resulting diseased condition of the mind. It was possible, that the patient, J. C. Gorman, was not receiving the best of treatment, however, and therefore nothing would be left unturned, that might establish or disprove the charges laid in his complaint."

"In an institution of this kind," said Dr. Beland, "it is necessary that the best of individual care be given to each patient. It can hardly be said that any two cases being cared for there are exactly alike. It follows, then, that every case must receive individual treatment."
