The southpaw caught Beatty with a bunch of left-handers in the game, and he side-wheeled 'em down in fine style.  
London made trouble for a right-hand rookie named Darby in the fourth, and after he loaded the bases and gave a run, Fiebert went in. He hit Nason on the knee to force in the second run, but was unhittable until the eighth, when, Effert walked, and Sandquist tripled to right center. Sandy made a clean steal of home, too, but Mike Baker didn't see him coming and lifted a long fly to John, whose peg was too late to double the runner at third.  
Hank Luce got his second homer in two days, the blow coming in the sixth with Regan on base. It helped a heap. Hudson's single, theft of second and Luce's long base knock to center gained the first marker in the third.  
The winning run came in the seventh when Delman erred. Fiebert singled to right and moved up on Morehart's infield out. Runner spanked one off Del's glove, and beat it out, but Joe tried to catch him and threw away from Beatty, so Fiebert scored.

Fred Hunter, who has replaced Marty Becker as manager, was in charge.

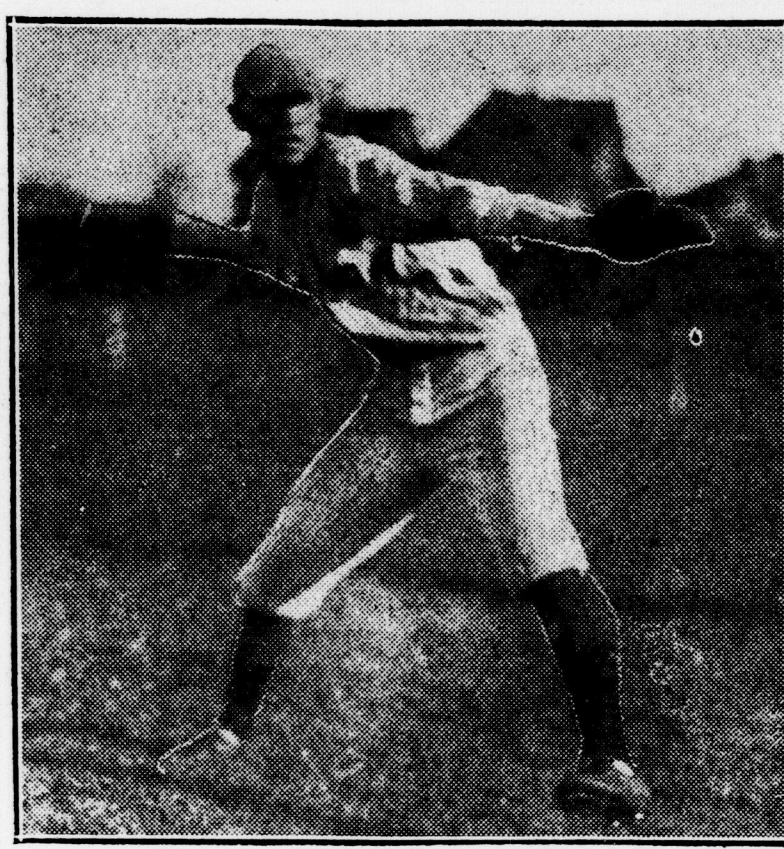

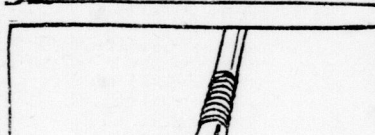
