



The ordinary estimates for 1923-24 are £421,000,000 as compared with £473,000,000 last year. Mr. Baldwin said it was not intended to provide any margin for supplementary esti-

He estimated the total expenditure for the coming financial year at £816,616,000. The total revenue for the new year on the basis of the existing taxation is estimated at £852. 650,000, leaving a surplus of slightly more than £36,000,000.

The chancellor of the exchequer announced that the corporation tax would be reduced by one-half and the ncome tax reduced from five shillings

sugar tax, the chancellor declared, but Nearly 500 applications were dealt he hoped that the condition of the world markets would permit such reduction at an early date.

Cut in Beer Tax. A cut was announced in the duty on beer so as to allow a reduction of a penny per pint in the retail price. The total dead weight debt, which on March 31, 1922, was £7,676,000,000 was given at £7,773,000,000 on March 31 last, but the chancellor stated tha the effective reduction in the debt

amounted to £149,000,000. The only external debts outstanding are to the United States and Canada. The amount of outstanding Canadian dollar debt is practically sterling bonds held by Great Britain The chancellor anticipated that these two debts would be set off against one another. O year ago the external debt stood at £1,090,000,000, and at the end of March last at £1 155,
