PRICES HOLD STEADY AT TORONTO MARKET

Offerings Are Light and Only Slight Activity Is Displayed.

Toronto, Aug. 16.—Today being the last day of the week, the run was very light at the Union Stock Yards, and there was little activity in the market. No good cattle were received. Common to medium cattle sold at steady prices. Thirteen loads of western stock came in, and this morning nine loads were sold at \$10.00 for milkers and a load of cows sold as high as \$5.00. Stockers sold up to \$5.50. There is a strong demand for milkers and springers. Buyers would take more choice butcher cattle than has been offered this week.

Calves sold steady at \$11 for tops. Good lambs held firm at \$10.00 and sold at \$9.00. Hogs sold at \$10.00 and \$10.50 fed and watered.
