UNITED FARMERS OF MANITOBA ASK FOR FREE TRADE

Delegates to U. F. M. Conference Demand Clause Be Amended.

DISCUSS SENATE

Winnipeg, Jan. 10.—Absolute free trade is the ideal of the United Farmers of Manitoba. The convention this morning insisted on amending a clause in the "declaration of principles" issued by the council of agriculture to make it plain that nothing less would satisfy the members' ultimate hopes.

The clause, as amended, condemned the principle of tariff protection, advocated a tariff based solely on the needs of public revenue but looking forward to a policy of absolutely free trade, and urged an increased British preference and a reciprocal trade agreement with the United States. The original clause had made no direct mention of free trade and it was explained by John W. Ward, secretary of the council of agriculture, that it had been thought condemnation of protection as a principle covered the case.

Almost the entire morning was taken up in consideration of the 15 clauses in the declaration, which was issued some weeks ago.

There was considerable discussion over a clause which advised reform of the senate based on the principal of elective membership. The United Farmers of Ontario had amended this into a recommendation for the abolition of the senate, and there were advocates in the convention today of both courses. J. L. Brown, M.P. for Lisgar, said he had seen instances where the senate had rendered very useful service and he was inclined to favor the reform rather than the abolition. Another delegate suggested that "even a progressive government" might pass legislation which could be improved by revision. Others saw no good whatever in the second chamber, but on a vote being taken the supporters of reform carried the day over those favoring abolition.

Two clauses added by the United Farmers of Ontario were accepted. One advocated prohibition of manufacture, importation and sale of intoxicating liquors in Canada; and the other sought repeal of legislation "which permits the deportation of residents of Canada by the immigration authorities without trial by jury."

Mr. Ward explained that mention of prohibition had been omitted from the declaration by the council because prohibition was a provincial matter, and the declaration was federal in its scope. The convention is to be continued tonight.

CONVICTION CONFIRMED IN CORPORAL'S CASE

Catholic Soldier Refused To Parade For Anglican Service.

London, Jan. 10.—In the case of the Catholic corporal in the Army Service Corps who refused to parade for service in an Anglican church and was sentenced last week to 56 days' detention and the loss of stripes which he had won in the war, the sentence has been remitted by the army council but the conviction is confirmed.

The decision to confirm the corporal's conviction has been made in order to maintain the official view, it is alleged, that religious belief, however genuine it may be, affords no justification for refusal to obey the lawful command of a superior officer.

In connection with the conviction and sentence of the offending corporal it was stated that he was told at the time he was ordered to parade for the religious service that he would not be expected to attend the service itself.

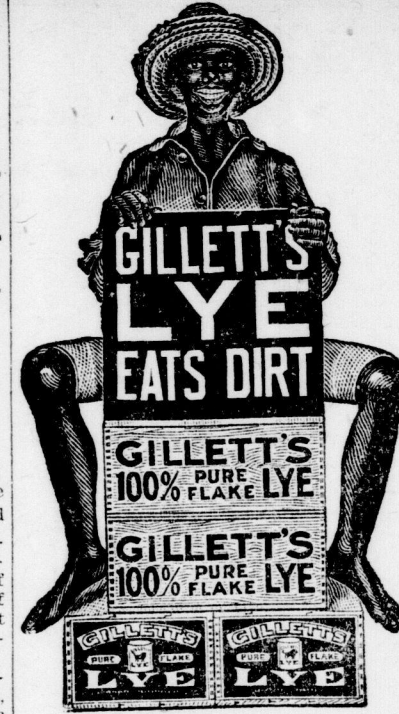
SIR AUCKLAND FEELS FIT AS A FIDDLE

Retiring British Ambassador Will Not Stay Long in Washington.

New York, Jan. 10.—Sir Auckland Geddes, retiring ambassador from Great Britain, returned on the Mauretania today saying that, although he had quite recovered from the eye trouble that prompted his resignation, he would remain in Washington only long enough to greet his successor and bid farewell to the United States.
"Look at me," he commanded newspapermen. "Don't I look fit as a fiddle? Well, that's how I feel."
The ambassador expects his successor to arrive late this month on the Aquitania, upon which Sir Auckland hopes to return to Great Britain. Few matters of importance remain to be attended to, he said. The proposed 12-mile treaty is the biggest current diplomatic job and that "seemed to be progressing fairly well."

BATTERY CAR IS RUN

Leaves Shop At St. Catharines Under Own Power For Toronto.

St. Catharines, Jan. 10.—The largest storage battery car yet built in the Canadian National Electric Line's shop in St. Catharines left today under its own power for Toronto, where it will be used on the suburban run between Toronto and Weston. The car, which is 58 feet long, weighs 40 tons, and has seating capacity for 60 passengers, has a running speed of over 45 miles an hour.

HARVESTERS WILL BE OFFERED JOBS

Ontario Government Offers To Place 150 in Toronto, on Farms.

Ottawa, Jan. 10.—The government is prepared to offer the 150 British harvesters stranded in Toronto work on the farm and will pay their transportation to places of employment. On the other hand, the government has no intention of supporting men who will not accept work when it is offered to them.
