Canada and United States Come to Terms Re Tariff.

MINOR CONCESSIONS

OTTAWA, Mar. 27.—The news of the tariff agreement at Washington is received in government circles at Ottawa with satisfaction, which is not at all unusual, by the fact that such an outcome has been confidently looked for ever since the conference at Albany between President Taft and Hon. Mr. Fielding.

It is understood that the despatches sent from Washington credit Hon. Mr. Fielding with having made rather more extensive concessions than have really been given.

It is also understood that any changes in the Canadian tariff, in consequence of the negotiations between President Taft and Hon. Mr. Fielding, will be confined to the United States, or even to the countries which now have the most favored nation arrangements with Canada.

A RESOLUTION

FREDERICTON, Mar. 24.—In the Fredericton Gleaser a few days ago, there appeared a letter signed "Parish of Durham." In the letter reference was made to Hon. Mr. LaBallois' course in regard to the unauthorized expenditure of road money by John McGovern in Durham. It will be remembered that Mr. LaBallois, in the Public Accounts Committee, brought to light the fact that McGovern spent \$250 on unauthorized road work last year.

The letter said: "We want to know if the fact that McGovern spent \$250 on unauthorized road work last year, according to the Auditor General's report, has been taken into account on the roads. Hon. Mr. LaBallois knows well that he paid out thousands of dollars of our money without a voucher or anything to show where it went and which he knows can be proven, and he went to know McGovern that money or what happened it."
