### HOW TO KILL QUACK GRASS

Methods to Be Employed to Eliminate This Garden and Field Nuisance.

This weed is a perennial, propagated by seeds and sweeping root-stalks, persistent in all deep ploughed lands and in all crops, having great power in spreading and choking out other plants.

The permanent means of breaking this weed under control is to adopt for the area infested a sort of rotation of crops or cropping plan which includes a hood crop, once in three or four years. A short rotation of three years duration is preferable—where there is a hood crop, only one crop of hay is a three year period conditions which tend to give the best the least chance of flourishing. Another suitable rotation is one of four years duration of one year each in hood, grain, clover and timothy hay crop. For timothy hay or pasture areas the procedure is as follows:

Allow the plan to exhaust its substance in the production of a hay crop, which should be cut and moved as soon as the head is formed, and before it is in bloom. Plough shallow, roll, and once or twice break up the soil and then cultivate with a stiff tooth cultivator until the root-stalks have been pulled to the surface of a soil. When the accumulation of roots is so great as to interfere with the efficient working of the cultivator remove or burn them and continue cultivating in order to complete the work. In the autumn, ridge or deep roots to the depth of four or five inches. Frost is an agent in the control of quack grass that should be made use of on every possible occasion.

Grain areas that contain quack are not in fit condition to be seeded down to grasses and clovers, nor are they in shape for the growing of profitable crops in the future until after control measures have been introduced. Immediately after harvest stubble land should be shallow ploughed, disc once or twice to break down and consolidate the furrow slices after which the stiff tooth cultivator can be employed to advance to obtain the necessary depth to facilitate the drawing of the root stalks or underground stems of quack to the surface. Cultivation should be thorough and the fall treatment as outlined for meadow or pasture land will apply on stubble.

**THE STIFF TOOTH CULTIVATOR** IS AN ESSENTIAL IMPLEMENT IN ANY CULTURAL PLAN FOR THE CONTROL OF QUACK GRASS. THE DISC HARROW USED AS THE COMBATANT IMPLEMENT ACTS AS A FORCE AGAINST THE SUCCESS OF OTHERWISE THOROUGH TREATMENT. THE USE OF THE DISC HARROW IN THIS CONNECTION SHOULD BE LIMITED TO WORK OF DISINTEGRATING AND PULVERIZING SOIL AND SURFACE RATHER THAN BREAK EACH ROOT INTO SEVERAL PARTS. EACH SMALL PIECE LIKE THE POTATO SET IS CAPABLE OF ESTABLISHING A NEW PLANT.

The following spring the area treated as described should be planted to hood crop for which manure may be applied, before the last ploughing or riding in the fall or during the winter or spring. This brings us to the first year of the rotation in which period the procedure in cropping would be as outlined in the rotations recommended.


Where no regular hood crop is grown, which is poor farm practice, rape or buckwheat sown on an infested area after it has been thoroughly cultivated and the root-stalks removed, prove excellent smothering crops. For late sowing and as "first aid" in the control of the weed on an exceptionally dirty field where other crops would be choked out and before attempting a hood crop the two mentioned crops are very useful. Smothering crops, however, are recommended only as a temporary means of control. It is only by thorough persistent cultural methods and the proper rotation of crops that any satisfactory degree of success will be attained.





### ADVOCATE MUSIC IN THE SCHOOLS

Barrie, Ont., School Board Favors Employment of Music Teacher.

At the recent meeting of the Barrie, Ont., Board of Education the question of appointing a music teacher for schools came up. A committee was appointed to look into the matter.

The Toronto, Ont., Separate School Board has appointed a second music instructor for its schools.

Stridvarius, monarch of the art of violin making, had reached the age of 50 before his hand and eye had acquired supreme his best instruments when he was between 56 and 58 years of age.

Handel was 18 years old before he published any of his great works; and he was 56 when "The Messiah," the grandest and most popular of his oratorios, appeared.

St. Louis, Mo., has formed a Civic Music League to advance the interests of music in that city.

Denver, Colo., has a municipal music commission, which controls a municipal auditorium seating 3,600 and a concert hall seating 10,000; a municipality at hand, which gives free daily concerts; free organ recitals by a municipal organist; and a municipal choir director who has developed a choir of 300 voices. The commission intend forming a symphony orchestra to round out its activities.

The Central Music Co., of Johnston, Pa., has formed among its employees a symphony orchestra of 50 men.

All the grammar schools of New Bedford, Mass., have orchestra made up of pupils taking music lessons in some one or other instrument. The High School also has an orchestra of advanced pupils, which give concerts several times throughout the year.

### THE POTATO CROP

The potato is one of our most important food crops, and yet it is one that very often does not receive the attention it should. It is the practice of many farmers to leave the planting of potatoes until practically all other crops are in. With the exception of the middle of the season, the Maritime Provinces this late planting means a much smaller yield than there would be if the planting were done before the middle of the season.

It is of the greatest importance to use good seed. Two lots of seed of the same variety and of the same age, very much alike may give a difference of three hundred or more bushels per acre in the crop, as has for instance one lot of Irish Cobbler yielded at the rate of 378 bushels per acre and another 37 bushels per acre. The best Green Mountain stock yielded 330 bushels per acre and one of the poorest 46 bushels per acre.

If possible, one should know where the seed was grown the previous year when the plants dried up early the plants this year are likely to be weak and the yield not very good. Good sized sets of from one to one and a half ounces have been found the most satisfactory, taking one year with another, although if the season is particularly favorable, the sets will produce a good crop, but one cannot tell what the season will be, hence it is better to be on the safe side.

The distance of planting which has been found most economical in most places in Canada is, rows two and a half to three feet apart, and sets twelve to fourteen inches apart in the rows. While quite shallow planting has given the highest average yields at Ottawa, it is necessary to plant about four inches deep for field culture to enable one to harrow before the potatoes are up without pulling up the sets.

The varieties which have been most generally satisfactory in Canada and Irish Cobbler as an early potato and Green Mountain as a main crop or later variety. Other varieties which cannot be distinguished from Green Mountain and are included in the Green Mountain group are Gold Coin, Uncle Sam, Wee MacGregor and Delaware. The Dooley of the Rural group has done well in the warmer parts of Ontario, and in coast climates Burbank is also popular.

**WEATHER PROPHECIES**



**PUBLIC NOTICE**

Under Sub-Section 2 of Section 70 of the Highway Act, 1918,

**No Motor Vehicle**

is allowed on any highway of the Province in the Spring of the year while the frost is coming out of the ground, without permission of the Supervisor, with the exception of Physicians, Clergymen and Ambulance Drivers. Sub-section 1 of the same section of the Act forbids the carrying of loads over 3000 pounds and the hauling of portable mills on wheels between the Fifteenth Day of March and the Fifteenth Day of May, in any year, without a written permit from the Supervisor of Roads. This notice will remain in force until the Supervisor is satisfied that the road is fit for motor traffic, as applied to sub-section 2, and until arrangement be made with the Supervisor in compliance with the Act, as applied to sub-section 1.
