

### SULLIVAN'S MILL RED BANK BURNED

On Monday Afternoon—Store and Residence Were Saved With Difficulty

Newcastle, N. B., July 6.—W. M. Sullivan's mill at Red Bank caught fire Monday afternoon between three and four o'clock, and was soon in flames. Aid was sought from Newcastle, and about four o'clock a contingent of firemen with fire engine left here on steamer Dorothy N. Sullivan's tug boat met her near here. The engine was on a scow; it arrived at 6.30, too late to save the mill, but helped to save the houses near. The mill was totally destroyed; also the wharf and deal piles. The store and residence were saved with difficulty.

Flames crossed the river and destroyed Charles Mullin's barn. About fifty men are out of work. It was Red Bank's principal industry. The insurance was at least \$10,000; the loss must be \$40,000.

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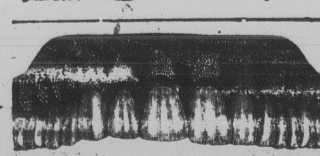

### BATHURST IS HAVING A BUILDING BOOM AT PRESENT

Many New Buildings and Improvements Under Way in all Sections of the Town

(From the Gloucester Northern Light) There is probably no better way to form an idea of the progress a community is making than by observing the number and quality of the buildings being added to the town's real estate holdings. By this standard, Bathurst has no reason to be discouraged with the showing made so far this season, for more than thirty buildings are at the present time under construction within the limits of the town, and a number more are to be started as soon as carpenters complete what they have under way. It is estimated that about 150 carpenters at least are now receiving employment, and as wages are very good, it is very easy to understand at least one reason why times are good in Bathurst.

One of the largest undertakings in the building line now under construction is the addition to the store of W. J. Kent & Co. This abuts on the present large store of this Company, and is the same size as the older building. It also is being constructed of brick and will be two storeys high. On the street it measures 40 ft. and extends back 110 ft. A basement has been excavated the full size of the building to a depth of nearly eight feet, and the foundation carried to the full height of the basement is of cement.

A start was made yesterday on another building of some size on Water St. when carpenters commenced to lay the sills of a 30x85 structure on the lot between the stores of I. DesRoches and J. P. Whelan. This building is being put up for Messrs. W. G. Fenwick and E. J. Palmer, and will be used for San up-to-date pool room and bowling alley when completed.

H. A. & H. W. Melanson's store and residences at the corner of St. Andrew's and King Sts. is just completed and about ready for occupancy. The first floor is to be used as a general store by the Messrs. Melanson, while the second floor will be occupied by Mr. H. W. Melanson as a residence. Three large plate glass windows are installed in the front of the store, two facing on King St. and one on St. Andrews St., and there are entrances from both streets, one between the plate glass windows on King St. and the other placed where the streets intersect, diagonally across the corner so that egress can be made from both streets.

The system of shelving adopted in the store is arranged as the result of years of experience and is most complete. A new idea in the making of the countermans has adopted wall board for the fronts instead of wood as is commonly used, and the effect is most attractive. The second floor is very conveniently divided into seven rooms and a bath and looks very well finished in two shades of wall board. A part of the first floor projects below the second floor and forms a balcony at the front of the building that gives it a pleasing and unusual effect.

Mr. Henry Bishop is building a very fine residence on his property adjoining the residence of Dr. J. N. Michaud on King St. A wide verandah of very attractive design extends the full width of the house, and the interior plan provides for ten large rooms and a bath room. Several new ideas are worked out in the arrangement of the windows and these add very much to the effectiveness of the building's general appearance.
