Reports of cases, however, come out. It is not long since that two attendants of the London Asylum, while in that city bn a visit, were attacked by the disease; and G.T.R. Conductor Wil-liam Kophell, who runs between Toronto liam. Kophell, who runs between Toronto and Stratford, with occasional trips to London, is laid up with the disease.
