AID, LAMB'S ABANDON PROPOSAL.

The Gas Company is very anxious

to refer the dispute between it and the

city to almost anyone except a legal

tribunal. One would think that the

courts of the country were better fitted

than any other institution or body

of men to define the relations between

the city and the company. The fact

of the matter is, Judge Ferguson has

investigated the gas question in too

impartial a way to satisfy the company

and now it wishes to transfer the

scene of action from the court of justice

to the City Hall. We are all surprised

that Aid, Lamb, of all his colleagues,

should be the one to assist the

Gas Company in its little game.

It is an unusual thing for the winner

in a law suit to approach the defeated

party with a view of effecting a compromise.

That is the position that

Aid, Lamb seems to think the city

should take in this case. We have

the judgment of the court in our favor

every particular as a matter of law

and we are entitled to a reduction in

gas to the extent of 55 cents per thousand

feet. Why, then, should the

City Council approach the Gas

Company as a matter of favor to

the citizens the benefit of a reduced

rate? The idea is preposterous

and should not be listened to. The city

of Toronto is a larger institution than

any other city in the world, and it

should do nothing to delay the final

decision of the court in the courts.

WHEELMEN AND GOOD ROADS.

The recommendation of the city

council to the council should charge

a license fee of one dollar on bicycles

which will be generally approved of

by wheelmen in Toronto. There is

probably no valid reason why the

council should impose a tax on bicycles

any more than on horses. As a

matter of fact, there would be very

good reasons for taxing all vehicles

drawn by horses and exempting bicy-

cles, as the latter do no perceptible

injury to the streets. It is a propo-

sition to tax bicycles, however, is in

the interests of wheelmen themselves,

and for this reason they will approve

of it. It has been said that wheelmen

will waste their time if they seek to

elect aldermen pledged to a good-roads

policy. Wheelmen should pay no at-

tention to advice of this kind. The

aldermen are in a position to do a

great many things that will facilitate

bicycling and render it more popular.

As the Inter-Club Committee state

the other night, brokers are preferable

to asphalt for wheeling, and if there

are aldermen in the council who know

the value of the bicycle, they should

see to it that bricks are recommended

wherever their use does not operate

injuriously to the ordinary traffic of

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
