# ANTS LIKE THEIR BOOZE, SAYS HARVARD SCIENTIST

Ants are like people—they like booze, they enjoy woman suffrage and many of them are skillful grafters—in the observation of Professor William Morton Wheeler, dean of the Bussey Museum at Harvard University, who has recently completed a tour of the world to learn what he could about the busy little fellows.

Professor Wheeler invaded many Professor Wheeler invaded many countries traveling through dangerous parts of Africa, Asia and other localities in his hunt for scientific knowledge. That "man after all is but a large brained animal," is one of his conclusions. He met and be-came acquainted with about 10,000

came acquainted with about 10,000 species of ants during his travels.

"The similarity between these insects and humans is striking," he comments. "Three fundamentals guide their lives, like ours; they are hunger, sex and fear."

"In most insect orders the female is in control," he says, reminding that more than one expert has predicted this future for mankind.

"The numerous grafters among the ants reminds us of our own kind. Large numbers of ants, like humans, manage to get their living without working for it."

Professor Wheeler found the booze-loving ants in large numbers in the tropics. Whenever they get the chance, he explains, they will climb all over, and into, if possible, the wine, beer and rum casks sent to that area in generous quantities. They make it perfectly clear that they like the stuff from the way they go after it, and they get helplessly intoxicated on it, too, he declares.

THE COAL STRIKE

It is twenty years since there has been a great coal strike. In 1902 the strikers were led by John Mitchell and were led with unusual ability. There can be no question of the capacity of Mr. Mitchell, for he died leaving a fortune that might almost entitle him to rank with the pluto-crats, and he did this without ever giving rise to the suspicion that he was false or indifferent to the interests of the union men who regarded him as their champion. Another John, to wit Lewis, is now leading the coal miners, who are waging what may be the greatest strike in the history of this continent. Only its vast possibil ities for the disruption of business, the destruction of industries, even the sacrifice of human life, make it practically certain that it will not be allowed to exert its full pressure up-on the public. If the strike is not settled in a few weeks the Govern-ment will intervene. No matter who is wrong, no matter if right is altogether on the side of one party and wrong the exclusive attribute of the other, the American Government can not afford to consider anything but the interests of the people who will starve to death next Summer or freeze to death next Winter if the mines are not operated.

This fact is the ace the miners have up their sleeve. They know that as a last resource the Government will operate the mines, and if the Government operates it will not be with soldiers or civil servants. It will be with the men who have operated the mines, that is with the strikers and the non-union men who may not join the strikers. The strength of their position is increased by the fact that the mine owners do not want either Government operation or a Government investigation into the question of the profits made by the owners. The owners must win the strike in a hurry or not win it at all. Latest news is to the effect that the strikers are being joined by an unexpectedly large number of non-union workers. Unless the owners are able to convince the general pub-lic that the high prices it is obliged Is your subscription paid in advance?
