TELEVISION—SHORTWAVE RELAY CONTRACTS

Mr. MacLean (Queens):

1. Has the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation entered into a contract with any company for the use of shortwave relay facilities between any point in the United States or the United States border and any city in Canada for the purpose of relaying television programs?

2. If so, what is the amount of such contracts, for what period is each contract and how many hours of program have been transmitted over such systems to date?

Mr. McCann:

- 1. Yes, as part of a general contract with the Bell Telephone Company of Canada for a microwave network service connecting Toronto, Ottawa and Montreal together for Canadian television program exchanges, and with the terminal of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company in Buffalo for American exchanges.
- 2. This contract sets the total annual basic cost for the Toronto, Ottawa, Montreal service, together with the Buffalo-Toronto connection, at \$225,486 and it provides for a detailed tariff for occasional, duplicate and reversal service. The period of the contract is for 5 years commencing May 1, 1953. However, programs have been transmitted on the Buffalo-Toronto circuit on an interim basis since January 19, 1953, for a total of approximately 30 hours.
