MEASURE WINDING UP EXPO

The House resumed consideration of the motion of Mr. Pepin that Bill C-6, to wind up the Canadian Corporation for the 1967 World Exhibition and to authorize the writing-off of certain costs and the deferral of certain payments connected therewith, be read the third time and do pass.

Hon. D. S. Harkness (Calgary Centre): Mr. Speaker, during second reading of this bill, during the meetings of the Finance, Trade and Economic Affairs Committee which considered the bill, and to some extent this afternoon at the report stage several speakers laid a great deal of emphasis upon the great success of the exhibition and the indirect benefits which it brought to Canada. There is no argument in this regard. I think everyone recognizes that the exhibition was a tremendous success and that it brought many indirect benefits to Canada in the way of advertising throughout the world, the possibility of increased tax returns and other benefits along that line. However, the reason for a good many of the questions raised in connection with this measure, both here and in the committee which considered it—and this is really
