SOVIET ACTION AGAINST SYMPOSIUM OF JEWS IN MOSCOW-POSSIBILITY OF CANADIAN PROTEST

I can assure the honourable member and the House that the government aims again at increasing this percentage for the current year, and I hope that the statistics we will publish next year on that matter will reflect significant improvement in the situation.
