My Dear Sir Arthur:-

Your kind letter is to hand and as I assure you much appreciated. While there is no doubt about it that the tactics of our opponents helped us in the campaign, nevertheless the assistance and encouragement received from our friends both inside and outside of the riding was really wonderful. No man could fail to do exceedingly well with the people at his back whom I had supporting me.
