## MORE MONEY FOR POSTAL EMPLOYEES

Twenty-Five-Cent Raise Was Granted to Postmen, Clerks and Porters.

Hon. Louis Pellerin, postmaster-general, has announced that, dating from April 1, letter carriers, porters and all clerks not in the graded classes will receive 25c a day more than formerly.

The letter carriers and porters will receive further benefit from the new regulations. They will receive \$2 per day now at the start, with an opportunity to reach the maximum wage, \$3 per day, in four years. Formerly it took eight years to climb to the maximum. The \$20 increase which these men have been getting each year has been cancelled and an additional week's holidays substituted, so that the men who bear the brunt of the heavy work of the department will now be on vacation for three weeks. To meet this change the delivery staff will be increased.

Trustee Fairbairn announced yesterday at the advisory industrial education committee that the Canadian Manufacturers' Association was organizing a movement to secure action by the Borden Government with respect to the recommendations of the royal commission on technical education. Mayor Hocken, he stated, had agreed to have the city represented in a deputation to Ottawa.
