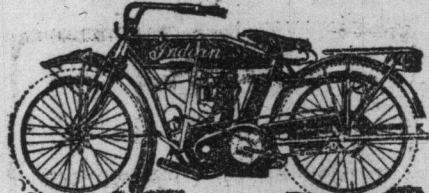

WARD TWO AHEAD BY TWO THOUSAND

Assessment Jumps Ten Million—North Toronto Ratepayers Again Astonished.

Assessment of ward two is completed and shows an increase of over ten millions. Under the new law, which exempts higher incomes from taxation, the income assessment shows a decrease. The report is as follows:
Land—1914, \$33,249,371; 1913, \$25,031,637.
Buildings—1914, \$24,177,559; 1913, \$22,775,199.
Income—1914, \$1,319,606; 1913, \$79,986.
Business—1914, \$4,750,255; 1913, \$755,580.
Total assessment—1914, \$63,506,791; 1913, \$52,051,131.
Exemptions—1914, \$5,570,720; 1912, \$5,255,576.
Population—1913, 65,561; 1912, 63,495; Increase, 2066.

North Toronto ratepayers are astonished at the increase in their assessment, and many will appeal. The main increase in East Toronto is \$50 per front foot on the north side of Queen street.
