Now to prevent any discrepancies such as the above the suggestion was put forward at the meeting, and at the next general meeting it is hoped to pass the bylaw. Then in future all moneys received from such benefits will be turned into the T. & D. treasury, and the money will be paid out as it is needed. If any money is left over after all righteous expenses have been paid it will be put into a sinking fund to be used in future cases. 
