

W HEN the yellow fever immune had the disease his blood produ ed the immunizing principle in sufficient quantity to kill the fever germs, and he got well. After that a good deal of the principle remained in his blood, and whenever a yellow fever germ—a month or a year or two years later—tried to invade his system, it was pounced upon and killed out of hand.
