That the memorable Victory gained over the *French* near *Minden* has long made a deep Imprefiion on the Minds of His Majefty's People; and that, if the Crifis in which that Battle was fought, the fuperior Numbers of the Enemy, and the great and able Conduct of His Majefty's General, Prince *Ferdinand* of *Brunfwick*, are confidered, that Action must be the Subject of lasting Admiration and Thankfulnefs.

That if any thing could fill the Breafts of His Majefty's good Subjects with ftill farther Degrees of Exultation, it is the diffinguithed and unbroken Valour of His Majefty's Troops, owned and applauded by those whom they overcame. The glory they have gained is not merely their own; but, in a national View, is one of the most important Circumstances of our Success, as it must be a striking Admonition to our Enemics, with whom they have to contend.

That His Majefty's good Brother and Ally the King of *Pruffia*, attacked and furrounded by fo many confiderable Fowers, has, by his Magnanimity and Abilities, and the Bravery of his Troops, been able, in a furprizing Manner, to prevent the Mifchiefs concerted with fuch united Force against him.

His Majefty has farther commanded us to obferve to you, That, as His Majefty entered into this War, not from Views of Ambition, fo he does not with to continue it from Motives of Refentment. The Define of His Majefty's Heart is, to fee a Stop put to the Effufion of Chriftian Blood. Whenever fuch Terms of Peace can be eftablished, as shall be just and honourable for His Majefty and His Allies, and by procuring fuch Advantages, as, from the Succeffes of His Majefty's Arms, may, in Realon and Equity, be expected, shall bring along with them full Security for the future; His Majefty will rejoice to fee the Repose of *Europe* reftored on fuch folid and durable l'oundations, and His faithful Subjefts, to whose liberal Support and unschen Firmness His Majefty owes fo much, happy in the Enjoyment of the Blefsings of Peace and Tranquillity. But, in order to this great and defirable End, His Majefty is confident you will agree with Him, that it is necessary to make ample Provision for carrying on the War, in all Parts, with the utmost Vigour.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

We are commanded by His Majefty to affure you, That the great Supplies, which were given the laft Seffion, have been faithfully employed for the Purpoles for which they were granted; but the uncommon Extent of this War, and the various Services neceffary to be provided for, in order to fecure Succefs to His Majefty's Meafures, have unavoidably occafioned extraordinary Expences, an Account of which will be laid before you.

His Majefty has also ordered the proper Effimates for the Service of the enfuing Year to be prepared and laid before you; and His Majefty defires you to grant Him fuch Supplies, as shall be necessary to suffain and press, with Effect, all our extensive Operations against the Enemy; and, at the same Time, by the Bleffing of God, to repel and frustrate their daring Designs against His Majesty's Kingdoms.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

His Majefty has, in the laft Place, been gracioufly pleafed to command us to repeat to you the Affurances of the high Satisfaction His Majefty takes in that Union and good Harmony, which is foconfpicuous amongft His faithful Subjects; happy in feeing it continued and confirmed; and to obferve to you, that Experience has thewn, how much we all owe to it; and that nothing elfe can effectually fecure the true Happiness of His People.

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
