



HORTON INQUEST.
"We, the jury, find that Samuel Horton came to his death in the Western Hospital on the 22nd day of August, 1911, as a result of an automobile accident. We exonerate the driver from all blame."
This was the verdict of the jury at the morgue hast night, after listening to the evidence in regard to the motor accident at Swansea last Tuesday.
F. Burrows, of 68 Roncesvalles avenue, was driving his own car into the city from Mimico. The electric lights were out, and shortly after passing the Humber River bridge a man loomed up a few feet in front and about a foot north of the car. The man seemed to dive forward and was struck on the head y a searchlight before the machine could be controlled. The car ' was immediately stopped, and the unconscious man was conveyed in the motor to the Western Hospital, where he died about four hours later.
