Major Beattle called attention to the fact that for the first time supplies for the military camp at London were not obtained by tender. Instead four or five friends of the Government were privately handed papers and asked to send in the supplies.

At this point the Speaker intervened with a ruling that controversial matter could not be introduced at this

Later, however, on motion to go into supply, Major Beattie brought up the matter, adding that when a Conservative applied for a paper in order to tender he was told that his "name was not on the list." He put in a tender on ordinary paper, however, and believed his offer was half a cent a pound for beef lower than the price at which the contract was given. This was the rule followed under Conservative regime, when the Liberals also got tenders. He wanted to know if this petty jobbery system was to be continued.

if this petty jobbery system was to be continued.

Mr. Gibson referred to the camp at Niagara as having been supplied for years on this principle, only Conservatives getting contracts. Besides Mr. McCleary, member for Welland, had in times past got fat contracts without competition for timber for the Welland Canal. He defied Major Beattle to name one Liberal who had a military contract in London.

Mr. Beattle promptly arose and named Johnstone Bros. as the contractors for supplying bread to the permanent corps. The firm, he added, were "bitter Grits." (Cheers and laughter.)

MR. McCLEARY RETORTS.

MR. McCLEARY RETORTS. Mr. McCleary thought the accusations against him came with bad grace from a gentleman who had waxed fat and rich on contracts obtained without public tender. He gave an instance of a Liberal in Niagara who, having got a tip as to the figure of a Tory's tender for carpenter work for the camp a tip as to the figure of a Tory's ten-der for carpenter work for the camp there, the said tender being the low-est, wrote the department at Ottawa and was told if he took the work as low as the Tory he would get the job, and he did. (Laughter.) For himself the records of the department would show that his firm had never obtained a contract except in public competi-tion.

Mr. Ingram defended the former militia regime from charges of favorit-ism, as did Sir Adolphe Caron, who de-clared that in his time all contracts for camp supplies were given, after due publication, to the lowest tender.

"Why," he went on, "what have I had to do every day? Why, my work day by day is cancelling frauds committed by my predecessor in office."

A lively scene ensued, Mr. Mulock exclaimed excitedly, "I do charge fraud."
Sir Adolphe Caron indignantly de-

marded if the Postmaster-General General charged him with fraud.
