TARIFF POSSIBILITIES LIMITED.

The Tariff Commissioners will resume their enquiry to-morrow at Hamilton. The commissioners will, no doubt, become possessed of a great many facts which they ought to know, but the information they need most of all cannot be obtained from manufacturers or consumers. The most difficult problem the Government has before it is the devising of a scheme that will at the same time reduce the tariff and raise the necessary revenue for governmental purposes. The result of the enquiry subsequent to the passage of the Wilson bill was an immediate decrease in the revenue, a decrease that kept getting larger, and that finally began to seriously embarrass the country. The fiscal necessities of the United States Government have led to the adjustment of the tariff that will increase the revenue. This means a return to protection on the McKinley plan. Our own Government will find it impossible to raise the necessary revenue for the country's needs by reducing the tariff to a 25 per cent. basis, as has been suggested. The Government will find it practically impossible to alter the tariff without affording manufacturers as much protection as they now enjoy. The so-called consumer cannot get off with less taxation than he is now paying. Under any reduction of the tariff we must raise the usual amount of revenue, and the Government is practically committed to the principle of incidental protection as far as the fiscal necessities of the country permit. The Government's hands are really tied. They cannot materially alter the present tariff.

THE OPTIC SHOULD NOT BE EXTENDED.

Why should we not have a boom on the Canadian side of the Niagara River similar to that which has been under way on the other side for a few years back? The activity on the American side is due altogether to the development of electric power from the Niagara Falls. We have the same power on this side of the river. We have the benefit of the experience of the American company. Furthermore, the development of power on our side of the river will not be one-half as costly as on the American side. This is as that on the American side the power is developed on the Canadian side. Why, then, should we not have paper mills, reduction works, car shops and a dozen other different industries under way on this side the same as on the other? As soon as power is available factories will gravitate towards it. If the American company is able to sell current in Buffalo for 43c per horse power per annum, good for 24 hours a day, we ought to be able to get it at Hamilton for only 15c.

A LITTLE LOVE FEAST.

Sir Joseph, replying to the toast, eulogized Mr. Bayard, who, he said, had endeared himself to his country by his genuine love for the Old Country. Mr. Bayard, he added, must have a feeling of the greatest satisfaction in the fact that he had privately remarked to him during the evening, that the hope of his life had been almost fulfilled, and when he left it would be able to feel that he had been almost fulfilled. Sir Joseph threatened the amicable relations of the United States and Great Britain. He said that he was proud of his term of office. This Sir Joseph described as largely due to Mr. Bayard's beneficent efforts.

A BETTER FIELD FOR THEIR ENERGIES.

If Hon. G. W. Ross will turn his attention to the fact that no other country he will find that consumption carries off three or four times as many victims as drunkenness. This disease causes a great deal more misery and mental anguish than intemperance. It is the greatest scourge of the human race, a popular crusade against consumption would benefit humanity ten times as much as a popular agitation against drunkenness. Between consumption and drunkenness there are these essential differences: The former can be stamped out to a very large extent at least by the enforcement of a few simple sanitary precautions. The latter can be eliminated by no degree of restrictive legislation. In regard to consumption, there is no dispute about its baneful effects. No one developed the evil perpetuated. If Hon. G. W. Ross and his temperance friends were to undertake a crusade against consumption they would find no licensed victuallers' Association opposing them. They would have every-thing their own way. No one resists the liquor traffic. The personal liberty of the individual. It involves a tyranny over individual rights that humanity will never consent to endure. Prohibition is an impossible condition. The practical suppression of consumption is not only possible, but medical men say it is quite feasible. If we were to appoint as many san-

tary inspectors to separate those afflicted with the disease from the healthy part of the community as we have license inspectors we would soon subdue the hideous monster. Let our temperance friends divert their energies to such a reform as the prohibition of consumption (it should be prohibited, being to a large extent a preventable disease) and they will have the whole people with them. They will save thousands of lives annually. They will mitigate more human suffering and misery than the prohibition of the liquor traffic can ever do. Their efforts to prohibit the use of opium and liquor will surely end in failure. An intelligent and rational education of the people towards temperance is commendable. The use of physical force to prevent people from drinking a beverage that half the world believes to be harmless is little short of insanity.
